The number of people I have met who are supporting their fully grown progeny is astonishing. Money, baby sitting, cooking, driving, organising, counselling... housing!

They're our children, they say, we love them, they say. We want to make sure they're OK.

Will they be OK if we catch them every time they're about to fall? What will they learn about their behaviour? Will they be OK if they think it's allowable to use people, to take without giving? How will they have healthy relationships?

The number of people I have met who are estranged from their adult children is equally astonishing. Minor issues can result in years of No Speakies. It's torture!

Grandchildren are often used as currency when the gloves are off, with grandparents willing to take the punchs to be involved in the little ones' lives. It is particularly difficult if people are compromised, further straining relations. Pack your bags, we're going on a Guilt Trip!

Respect is a hard-earned badge, taking time to build and an instant to destroy. Once that is gone, the hill gets steeper.

Yet we keep trudging upwards, hoping next time it will be different, next time the disdain won't be so noticeable and a regular conversation might just be possible.

Those with adult children at home are often outwardly happy with the situation, while some are accepting of their lot due to the ridiculous rents their offspring would have to pay and the cost of living out there.

It's a sticky situation but the one truth is that these adult children will not learn resilience nor financial management.

This Christmas season, which can be a particularly difficult time for those facing these circumstances, give yourselves a gift. Discover the power of the word No. No more abuse. Discover the joy of seeing your adult child become an adult.

Masons' gavel passes to next gen

Lifetime Sheffield resident and taekwondo master Darren Hyland has been installed as Worshipful Master of Roland Lodge after only five years with the Freemasons.



Darren, 52, is the youngest new Master to be inducted into the role in 20 years.

He takes over from Laurie Appleby who was recently made a Right Worshipful Brother with the Grand Lodge – a highly esteemed international position.

Darren said he got to know Laurie when the pair were doing a rigging course many years ago and the discussion turned to freemasonry.

His grandfather had also been a Freemason, as well as a few close friends. "I was

attracted to the camaraderie with other members and what we stand for," he said. "We're a charitable organisation that helps people in need."

The Masons' motto is Making Good Men Better. "Our goal is not to be better than anyone else, but to be better men than we used to be."

Darren is Assistant Grand Master for the World Shim Jang Taekwondo Association which runs 12 traditional self-defence classes along the north west coast.

"There's a lot of similarities with taekwondo," he said. "The discipline, respect, loyalty. Basically being a better person."

Darren said the only secret surrounding freemasonry was not being more public about what the organisation does with its fundraising money.

"This year alone we have put \$500k has been distributed from Tasmanian Board of Benevolence into different organisations just in Tasmania," he said.

Roland Lodge recently donated \$1600 to the Sullivan family for travel expenses to attend daughter Quinn's futsal match in Malaysia (*see story, page 11*) and helps particularly in areas of hardship.

Money is raised locally through regular Bunnings sausage sizzles and monthly raffles at the Lodge.

"Members bring prizes and we can raise up to \$300-\$400 a meeting," Darren said. "It's an organisation that self sustains. We own the Lodge building and we're able to hire it out to any interested organisation."

He said the past five years with Masons had changed his perspective on life and he had learnt to be more open to people, more helpful. "You realise how precious life is."

Honoured and overwhelmed to be asked to be Worshipful Master, Darren has led by example and his 23-year-old son Colby has asked to join Roland Lodge.

He will be initiated as a Lewis Apprentice at the March Roland Lodge meeting.

Roland Lodge meets the third Thursday of each month from 7pm at 56 High Street, Sheffield. Board meetings are held on the first Monday of the month, where members discuss community needs and where their services can be best directed.

600+ visit open gardens

When calls started to come in from people planning to bring interstate visitors to see the Kentish gardens, we felt that our open garden weekend was going to be successful.

Seven private gardens opened to the public including two – one in High Street, Sheffield and the other at Claude Road – that had not opened before. Other open gardens were at Barrington, Nook and Acacia Hills



While the lead up to

the open weekend was nerve wracking for all the gardeners involved, the actual weekend was perfect for garden viewing with just a little cloud and a spattering of rain on Saturday (great garden viewing weather) and sunshine on Sunday. All up almost 600 people from across Tasmania (and interstate) visited the gardens over the open weekend.

My garden (*left*) was open, and it was touch and go as to whether the huge banksia rose hedge, the rhododendrons at the gate, the wisteria and the dogwoods would survive the rain and the winds that hit in the week before the opening. But they did and were greeted by oohs and aahs as visitors came through.

In addition to the delights of the gardens, the event also attracted stallholders keen to showcase their plants and garden art to garden visitors. This year four nurseries took part in the open weekend along with stalls offering metal work, pottery, craft and honey. Plants raised by the garden owners and Kentish Garden Club were also for sale.

The Club's next big community event is FlowerFEST 2025, which will be held at Sheffield Town Hall over the weekend of February 1-2 and will see the Town Hall filled with flowers.

Ninja nurse brings his skills to Kentish

Community health nurses are the Ninjas of the medical world, according to Rural Health care coordinator Jon DeLaine.

"We are out in the community, without the whole hospital at our fingertips – we have to adapt and find solutions that work in remote and regional settings," said the Sheffield-based nurse. "We do a lot with a little – we need to be creative and practical about how we overcome challenges."

Jon, a former wildlife ecologist who previously counted camels in the Northern Territory, has worked in the community health field for a decade.

His new role has seen him out in the community, from Lorinna to Beulah, promoting better health outcomes and understanding with Rural Health Tasmania. "We offer that local contact for a number of different support services.

"It's about connecting and understanding from a clinical view what can be done to manage a situation."

Often residents don't realise how much help the service can provide, from navigating My Aged Care, organising transport, blood pressure checks, advice on healthy ageing to childcare.

"A lot of the time what is required is for someone to sit down with simple language and help explain and navigate the systems," Jon said. "It can be daunting for health care professionals let alone individuals or someone with lower literacy or issues accessing computers."

Jon recently spoke at a Kentish Lions dinner and visits the Kentish Men's Shed monthly. He also conducts outreach programs throughout the municipality.

"It's an opportunity for people to see me in their own neighbourhood," he said. "They might want to talk in confidence about a concern.

"The blood pressure check, that's really the opportunity to start the connection because we get to sit down together and start chatting. People in agriculture with stock losses or difficult seasons, they might open up about that. And mention pain. So we book in appointments to see what else is going on."


She was pleased Quinn had made friendships with the other players. "It's so lovely Quinn has connected on what's app with some Malaysian players so she will be able to keep in contact with them.







A MESSAGE FROM KIM

Buying Food from the Kitchen at Claude Road Market

Once upon a time, the kitchen at Claude Road Market did not sell takeaway food. There were tables set up inside and outside for people to socialise and dine after shopping at the market stalls. If there were no tables free, people shared tables with others they had never met and made new friends.

When Covid hit it was necessary to change how things worked, so the sale of food became primarily a takeaway experience to enforce social distancing and this became the new modus operandi.

The community embraced the new experience and the hall's following grew exponentially. People started coming very early and buying enormous amounts of the affordable, homecooked food. People would come in and want to buy a whole cheesecake or a whole tray of food.

These large purchases resulted in the kitchen being sold out early in the day. When someone turned up at 11.30am for an early lunch, they faced a big 'Sold Out' sign. Some customers have complained and suggested that we just 'make more food'. What few people realise is that most of the food is made by one volunteer working very long hours in the lead-up to the market.

If it were just about the money, this would not be a problem but the aim of the market is to bring community together.



Our intention is to provide affordable food to as much of the community as we can, not just to sell food and make money.

We started setting limits (only two of any single item) but there were still people coming back over and over to fill up large containers. We have now decided to restrict the amount of takeaway food people are able to buy. We will also hold back half of the food for sale later in the morning. These limits will apply from the Christmas market on December 14.

The alternative to setting limits is to increase the prices of our food to a level which discourages those looking for bargain food. We have resisted this because we understand that there are many in the community who are struggling. There will always be exceptions to these rules and application can be made to exceed these limits in exceptional circumstances to be determined by any volunteer working in the kitchen.

We hope people understand that we just want everyone to come to the market, support the amazing stallholders, and either sit and enjoy a bite to eat or take away a treat for later.

GRANTS BOOST MEN'S SHEDS

The Tasmanian Government is supporting the State's important Men's Sheds to continue the work they do to provide a place for connection in the community.

Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing and Minister for Community Services, Roger Jaensch, said the State's 71 Men's Sheds are places of learning, sharing and connecting with others, and much more.

"Many of those who are connected to Men's Sheds across Tasmania have found themselves at a shed because someone suggested they drop in and find out what it's all about," Mr Jaensch said. "Some of those people have since told me that the Men's Shed, and the people they met there, saved their life.

"To help our local sheds play this life-changing role, the Tasmanian Government is providing \$175,000 in grants each year for the next two years. The grants are to help Men's Sheds replace tools and equipment and to support health and wellbeing programs at the Sheds.

"These grants are expected to open before the end of this month, and I encourage local sheds to get their projects and upgrades in mind and start fine-tuning details for their applications.

"As part of the Tasmanian Government's 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future, we have also committed to a \$1 million capital investment program to support Shed upgrades."

During a visit to Kentish Community Men's Shed, Mr Jaensch said the Tasmanian Government has been a long-time supporter of Men's Sheds in the community.

"We've invested more than \$70,000 over the past 10 years into upgrading and improving the Kentish Community Men's Shed because we understand the important role it plays in its local community," Mr Jaensch said.



Cethana opens its spillways to public

Members of the public saw first-hand how clean energy is generated when they went behind the scenes at Cethana Power Station on November 23.

Hydro Tasmania welcomed a capacity crowd of more than 170 people at the Cethana Open Day.

Participants were taken on a tour inside the underground station and got a close-up look at the 110m high Cethana Dam wall and massive spillway.

Cethana has been selected as the site for Tasmania's first proposed pumped hydro project and tour leaders detailed how it would work and what makes Cethana the ideal location.

The proposed project at Cethana would have a generating capacity of 750MW and provide up to 20 hours of storage.

Hydro Tasmania's Executive General Manager of People, Culture and Engagement Ruth Groom said open days are an important opportunity to connect with the community.

"Open days allow us to take the community behind the scenes and show them how we use water to keep the lights on in Tasmania," said Ms Groom.

"It's also a great chance for the community to learn about the next generation of hydropower with our exciting vision for building pumped hydro at Cethana."

Cethana Power Station was commissioned in 1971 and has a generating capacity of 100MW.


It is one of eight power stations in the run-of-river Mersey-Forth catchment in northwest Tasmania.


Water flows directly from a river and cascades through eight power stations, using the same water to generate energy multiple times.



Teddy Sheean stands proud in Latrobe

As the nation stopped to commemorate Remembrance Day – the life size statue of Ordinary Seaman Teddy Sheean VC was unveiled in Latrobe.

The Chief of Navy, Vice Admiral Mark Hammond AO, Latrobe Council Mayor Peter Freshney, and Teddy Sheean's nephew, Garry Ivory, and I were all on hand to witness the grand reveal.

The day was immense – Edward 'Teddy' Sheean VC is a national hero, he's my hero, and I couldn't be more proud. Teddy, a proud Tasmanian, displayed courage, mateship and sacrifice on 1 December 1942, when HMAS Armidale was under heavy attack by enemy aircraft.

His actions saved many lives, and in 2020, Teddy was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross, Australia's highest military honour.

I want to pay a special thanks to Garry Ivory, the nephew of Teddy Sheean VC, for spearheading the campaign for 32 years.

It was my honour to campaign with Garry, the Sheean family, the RSL, veterans and others for 17 years to secure the Victoria Cross.

And now, immortalised forevermore in Latrobe, Teddy's statue is a defining part of his legacy.

It allows future generations of Tasmanians to gaze upon the face of heroism and reflect on the importance of courage, mateship and sacrifice.

We're fortunate to have this physical reminder of Teddy here in Tasmania – I have written to the Federal Government




asking that Collins class submarine HMAS Sheean, upon its decommissioning, be gifted to Tasmania, acting as another physical reminder of Teddy's heroism.

I want to thank everyone involved, particularly the Latrobe Council who jointly funded this statue with the State Government. This is a nationally significant monument to a true Australian hero.

I don't know the area but presume it must have been warmer to grow and ripen the fruit. It may have gone to town on the train. My Dad was very superstitious as was his Mother - he knew they had Irish ancestry but I wish he'd known John came from Tipperary, he would have loved that!



MRLC sets 2000 tree target for 2025



Mount Roland Land Care (MRLC) will continue its tree planting program in 2025,

and already there is strong interest from landholders. The tree planting is supported by the Tasmanian Government's Healthy Tas program, and in 2025 we have a target of planting 2000 more trees.

Only a few landholder spaces remain for 2025, and MRLC is now calling for expressions of interest from landowners who may be interested in participating.

We are seeking expressions of interest from landowners with four types of sites, particularly: farmland; beside streams, rivers or waterways; on steeper slopes where there is a risk of soil creep (or soil slump); shelterbelts on farms; and in areas where patches of remnant bushland can be connected by new plantings.

It's a bonus if the site is in a highly visible location, where it will be easily seen by the public and serve as a demonstration site that inspires other landowners to do similar things.

The project is a partnership between the landholder, MRLC and volunteer tree planters. The landholder is responsible for site preparation, including fencing (to exclude browsing animals), weed control and ongoing maintenance once the seedlings are planted.

MRLC provides the plants, guards, mats and stakes and, if needed, technical assistance to the landowner with advice on species selection and planting layout.

MRLC also organises a public tree planting day, where the seedlings are planted, guarded and watered in as necessary. Volunteers participate in the public tree planting day – typically a Saturday from 10am. The tree planters also enjoy a lunch provided by the landholder as a thank you for their efforts.

- guiding the process of site selection and preparation
- providing a range of plants (in the 10s or 100s), plus guards, stakes and weed mats
- facilitating a public tree-planting day (by volunteers)

Settlers chase golden dreams in

The Beulah district is bounded on its east side by the Mersey River, on its west side by the Dasher River, on its north side by the Kentish Bridle Track Rd and on its south side by Union Bridge Rd, which connects Paradise and Mole Creek. As part of the County of Devon, the northern half of Beulah was designated the Parish of Roland and the southern half the Parish of Loxere. Within this uninhabited bushland, Foster Estate was granted land, often several miles wide, adjoining the eastern side of the Dasher River and stretching all the way from Paradise to Kimberley. In 1863 when the Deloraine district became the first municipality established on the Northwest coast, it included the Beulah and Paradise districts. It was only after floods washed away all the wooden bridges on the Mersey River several times, taking many months to be replaced, that it became apparent, in 1908, that Beulah and Paradise were better served as part of the new Kentish municipality that began in Jan 1908. Following the 1944 floods, it was more than 10 years before Dynan's Bridge was replaced.

First Settlers to North Beulah

As we saw previously, the original settlers to Paradise had to first cross great swathes of bushland belonging to Foster Estate to get to their selections, and the original settlers of Beulah had to do the same thing. About 1877/78, they forded the Dasher River at Duck Marsh off the old Paradise Rd and climbed the long hills eastward through Foster Estate until, on top of the hill, they found excellent fertile land they were free to purchase.

The first settlers were James (56) & Helen (44) Knowles with their family of eight boys and one girl, who took up 218 acres northwest of the present township of Beulah. On the next property were Bassett & Mary (Greenhill) Ferrar who settled on 320 acres and, adjoining them, William & Mary Ann Walker with seven children had another 320 acres. Mary Ann was the daughter of **Thos Johnson Jr** along the Old Paradise Rd & and granddaughter of **Dolly Dalrymple** of Sherwood, Latrobe. These three pioneering families were soon joined by two of Reuben Austin's sons, John and Albert Austin, on 150 acres and son-in-law George with wife Alice (Austin) Eagling on 48 acres. All these families had adjoining properties that stretched from the present-day Golden Gate Rd on top of the hill down to the future township of Beulah. Interestingly, all these families had been converted in revival meetings of the Christian Brethren evangelists in Kentish during 1874-75, and it seems they may have made a collective decision to pioneer this new farming district; not unlike the Wesleyan group of families that first came to Barrington.

Beulah given its Name

Just as Reuben Austin, their well-known friend and father to some of them, had named 'Paradise', so this group of settlers came up with another biblical name, 'Beulah', for their new district. At the time, Beulah was in common use as a name for substantial homesteads, suggesting 'peacefulness, contentment and bliss.' It first appeared in newspapers in July 1880: 'Beulah is the name of the new settlement south-east from Kentishbury, lying between the Mersey and Dasher Rivers.'

James Knowles held cottage meetings in his house until the mid-1880s when a small split-timber gospel hall was built on John & Albert Austin's farm on the southside of today's Golden Gate Rd. This building doubled as a day school for their children whenever a teacher became available. A few other settlers took up land south of them, but crossing the Dasher

River at Duck Marsh remained the only way in and out of Beulah, necessitating building a rough log bridge. This route remained a very rough track, not suitable for chaise carts, only bullocks or horseback, and after rain Duck Marsh became an impassable bog.

In 1880, when a few government ministers made their first visit to Beulah via Duck Marsh, a meeting held in the 'Beulah Hotel' (probably Knowles's living room) urged the building of a new access route by extending Vinegar Hill Rd down to a more stable crossing place through the Dasher River, but the Minnow Gold Rush changed all that.

Finding Gold in the Minnow

After finding rich gold deposits at Beaconsfield in June 1877, the discovery of gold six months later in the Minnow River by Sheffield prospector **J G (Jack) Johnson** couldn't have had a more dramatic impact on the northern area of our island. In Dec 1877 Jack Johnson quickly sold the general store he had just opened in **Sheffield** to **James Butt**, and along with his brothers **Thomas and Lewis**, and others, they began to explore two promising reefs they believed they had found. **Charles Coleman**'s sensational report titled The Sheffield Gold Fields, printed in the Examiner on 31 Dec 1877, had its predictable response: gold fever quickly spread, with hundreds of 'hopefuls' rushing to the Minnow River hoping to pick up a quick fortune. They came from Sheffield, Kentish, Latrobe, Railton, Deloraine and Launceston.

The shortest route from Sheffield and Kentish was to leave Old Paradise Rd at the Dasher River and track up what is today Watts Rd over the hill and come down directly on the Minnow goldfields. Railton prospectors formed a rough track from Dick Lowe's bridge, through Stoodley across the Bridal Track Rd and the Dasher River, up through North Beulah and down the Minnow. The most used track brought Deloraine and Launceston prospectors from Dunorlan down across Dynan's Ford at the Mersey River and onto the Minnow goldfields.

The Minnow River drains the top of Mt Roland and after heavy rain, pours down the mountainside in a series of spectacular cascades called the Minnow Falls. From the base of the mountain, the river flows northward between the Gog Range and the Paradise Hills where it crosses Union Track Rd to Mole Creek. The Minnow goldfields commenced here and continued as the Minnow River rounds the western end of the Gog Range and runs eastward through Lower Beulah for a couple of miles parallel to the Gog Range.

Several small tribute creeks running off the side of the Gog Range also contained traces of gold. The goldfields ended where the Minnow turns north to eventually join the Dasher River at the bottom of the Kentish Bridal Track Rd. Today, Lower Beulah Rd follows the route of the Minnow River quite closely from beginning to end.

But there was no quick money, and within a few weeks most of the 'hopefuls' had left, leaving the more committed prospectors to burn the bush for easier access and begin sluicing the gravelly creek bottoms and digging test holes alongside the riverbed. But digging and tunnelling was hard work, and not enough gold

was found. Still, everyone was hoping to find a gold lode where payable gold could be mined.

As the miners grew more confident about where to peg out their claims, the government sent two surveyors to the district. During 1879 –1880, one worked on a detailed survey of the entire Minnow River, while the other surveyed a proper road from Dunorlan railway station to the goldfields where he laid out a small township site called Minnow. The surveyors were kept busy granting 10-acre mining leases to more than two dozen groups, the first being **Thomas Johnson** and his three sons, **Thomas Jr, Jack & Lewis** of Sheffield. Other leases listing Sheffield people included: **John & Frank Greenhill, Stephen & Chas Smith, Malcolm Campbell, George Strawberry, Robert Manley, Wm Collard, James & Thomas Boutcher, James Butt and Reuben Austin.**

By July 1880, land speculators from Launceston began buying up the big blocks of land, hoping gold might be found on them. They included **W & T C Hawkes** of the Cornwall Hotel, **Benjamin W Campion** (a Longford solicitor), **W Hart** of Harts Hardware and **Harry Birchall**, managing director of A W Birchall's bookstore in Launceston. This was at a time when things looked to be booming. Wm Moore opened a storeroom on his 166-acre block and supplied the miners with meat and bread. There was even talk of building a hotel for the miners.

In Dec 1880, 27 investors formed the **Star of the West Gold Mining Co** and put up £10,000 to purchase mining & milling equipment. Seven investors from Sheffield committed to £650 each. Once, the mine's manager, **William Creelman**, who had been to Deloraine on business, arrived back at the Mersey River only to find it too high to cross. He had to walk upriver to what became known later as Kelly's Cage Rd and cross on a settler's barge, after which he became completely lost for three days and three nights. Shareholders in the **Blair Athol Gold Mining Co**, formed on 9 Dec 1881, all came from Westbury. Blair Athol was one of Britain's greatest racehorses of the 19th century. However, if all these investors thought they had backed winners at the Minnow, they were gravely mistaken.

Minnaw/Minnow Name Muddle

Like Mt Rolland/Roland, the Minnaw/Minnow River had its spelling problems. Reporting the excitement of finding gold at Beulah, The North West Post newspaper, printed in Latrobe, insisted on spelling it the 'Minnaw River'. Earliest handwritten maps had this river marked the Minnaw, Monnow and Munnow. Almost certainly it was named after the Monnow River that runs across southern Wales, England. But with all those vowel variations, I guess the surveyor's choice of Minnow River for its permanent name was a reasonable compromise.

First Road into Beulah

After government surveyor **Henry Chambers** surveyed the road from Dunorlan to the Minnow goldfields, the need for a bridge across the Mersey River at Dynan's Ford became an urgent necessity. In March 1882, **Charles Fenton**, the only son of historian **James Fenton** of Forth, won the contract to build this 150ft-wide bridge for £599. Six months later, Chalmers reported that many selectors, anxious to obtain good farmland in Beulah, had taken up 3803 acres, with more applications being made almost daily. **Geo Gregory** from Westwood, near Westbury, began advertising for 50 men to cut down scrub by the acre along the foothills of Gog Range. He had purchased more than a dozen blocks and needed men to scrub and burn

them off so he could sew them down with English grass seed. Some said Gregory would get his money back in one season.

Dynan's Bridge was completed 15 months later in August 1883, but by then the Minnow goldfields were in serious decline. For most mining parties, their results were devastating. The gold specks petered out, and there was no gold reef. The Johnson brothers traced alluvial gold to the higher ground of Mt Gog, but no mining parties could find a payable gold reef. In October 1883, the Star of the West mine was forced to close, and all hands were laid off. But as mining interest waned, farming fever increased. Roads from Paradise, Stoodley and Kimberley opened and the last of Beulah's good land was taken up.

First settlers at Lower Beulah

The first family to take up land in Lower Beulah were **Edward** (**Ted**) & Christiana Sharman and their seven children. Ted was one of five brothers & one sister belonging to **George & Mary Sharman**, all of whom came from Huntingdonshire, England, aboard the Panama, arriving in Hobart in April 1853. Near New Norfolk, Edward married German immigrant Christiana Hansh in 1867 before all the Sharmans moved north to Blackamore near Weegena. After Ted bought land in Lower Beulah, several other Sharman families followed.

Next came Ted & Christiana's good friends **Thomas & Mary Ann Jessop** with six of their offspring. They were also from Blackamore, where Thomas had been a farm overseer. Their eldest daughter, **Emma Jessop**, had married **Frederick Sharman** back in Oct 1868. Thomas Jessop selected a 200-acre block at the junction of Dynans Bridge Rd and Lower Beulah Rd, which later became the centre of the Lower Beulah settlement. A Methodist family, they had come from Suffolk, England, aboard the 977-ton Whirlwind, arriving in Launceston 31 March 1855.

Charles and Wm Frankcombe from Blackwood Creek behind Bracknell also purchased blocks on the western side of Thos Jessop. Just how close these three earliest families became is indicated by the four weddings held within two months in 1886 at the Wesleyan church, Deloraine. On the same day, 24 March 1886, Chas Frankcombe (21) m Anna Jessop (26) schoolteacher, Alfred Thomas Jessop (21) m Mary Sharman (17) and Chas Sharman (22) m Clara Jessop (23) schoolteacher. Two months later, on 18 May 1886, Wm Henry Frankcombe (23) m Mary Ann Martha Jessop (19).

On 1 Nov 1887, a post office was opened in Mrs **Clara Sharman**'s house called the Beulah Post Office. The mail was carried in nine miles from the Dunorlan railway station by Thomas Jessop (1887–1895) and Ed Sharman (1895–1904). But over the following years, as most Minnow goldminers left, scores of new settlers began occupying all the land between the two separate pioneer groups in the north and south areas of Beulah.

By the turn of the century, a small township developed in the centre of the Beulah district that included a school, public hall, church and local shop. In mid-1904, **John & Annie Best**'s recently opened store became the new Beulah Post Office, with mail deliveries now coming from Railton and Stoodley instead of via Dunorlan. On the same date, Clara Sharman's original PO, four miles away, was renamed for the first time, the Lower Beulah PO.

Use colour to make your garden 'pop'

There are many ways to make your garden stand out, and here is one trick I like to use. Incorporate yellow. I always find that yellow draws

attention to the garden, and then highlights the other colours. It's something I learnt from quilters. They always incorporate some yellow in a lot of their quilts for the same reason.

When we developed the garden in the photo, we planted 100 yellow Dutch Irises, because of their height and the fact that they repeat flower, giving a long show.

They were planted between a mixture of shrubs and ground covers so, as the garden grew, the irises would grow up above the shrubbery, making the whole garden stand out. I like the way the irises just pop up as a surprise element each Spring. There are a lot of choices out there that you could plant between your shrubs to get the same results.

If you want a native version, I recommend Bulbine glauca. This will flower from Spring right through to summer, has succulent

type leaves up to 60cm high with flowering stems of bright yellow flowers.

Give yellow a go, and Happy Gardening!
