Lower Barrington Hall Committee secretary Bronwyn Watson has been named Kentish Citizen of the Year at the Australia Day Ceremony held at Sheffield Town Hall.

In presenting the award, Mayor Kate Haberle said it was through Bronwyn's "tenacious work" that the committee had been able to secure funding to rebuild the old meeting room end of the hall.

"This has been a project that has been a long time in the planning process," Mayor Haberle said. "Bronwyn has followed many leads in order to seek funding for the benefit of the hall."

Bronwyn has also been the project manager of the restoration project, liaising with Kentish Council, builders and contractors at each of the demolition and rebuilding stages.

She also organised and picked up a brush for the repainting of the hall, inside and out, and actively chases community activities to hold there, such as markets, exercise classes, encouraging public health initiatives and more.

"Bronwyn puts in many unaccountable hours to keep the hall functioning, she is the first point of contact for all hall users, and she manages all this while maintaining a regular day job and keeping her family on track as well," Mayor Haberle said.

Steamfest celebrates 30 years

SteamFest is back over the March long weekend. This celebration of the steam age, vintage machinery, railways and the rural way of life in north-west Tasmania was first held in Sheffield in 1994. This will be the 30th annual SteamFest, and our volunteers are working very hard to make it the best ever, including some big changes to the event layout.

SteamFest is held in 8ha of fields, a short stroll from the centre of Sheffield, behind the railway station on the corner of Main and Spring Streets. Although patronage of up to 10,000 people is expected over the three days, everything is nicely spread out and it never feels too crowded.

What makes SteamFest so interesting for young and old is that almost everything on display is operational. Some of the machines date back into the 1800s, and have been lovingly restored so that you can see them working and appreciate the ingenuity and engineering skills of generations past.

This is what you can expect at SteamFest 2025:

- Twenty steam traction engines operating all long weekend: threshing, chaff cutting, straw pressing, stone crushing, slow racing, children's tug of war and a grand parade of everything that moves!
- A whole new look for the steam arena display.
- Steam and diesel train rides on the 2' gauge Redwater Creek railway throughout the event.
- Miniature steam, petrol and electric train rides on the 7.25" gauge railway plus a model railway display.
- Tasmania's biggest tractor pull.
- Vintage tractor and historic machinery displays.



- Tasmanian Lighthorse training demonstrations.
- Clydesdale rides, bullock team, farm animals and a working blacksmith.
- Woodchopping on the Monday.
- Steampunk, Victorian and Edwardian costumes.
- A great variety of food and craft stalls and interactive fun for the kids.

The SteamFest grounds and passenger train are wheelchair accessible. Dogs on lead are welcome too!

Kentish Museum set to re-open doors

Kentish's history will again be accessible with the re-opening of the Kentish Museum on February 22 after being closed for more than four years.

Volunteers have spent many hours restoring and preparing the collections for public display, with team members undertaking training to learn how to handle history properly.

The Museum collection consists of more than 2500 items and the cottage design of the building allows each room to be arranged with its own theme, providing visitors with a view of the past. The collection has been arranged with more visual displays, easy descriptions and other commentary to guide visitors through the museum.

Local pioneers and their stories as well as examples of their innovation are on display.

Natural resource management, including hydro-electricity and cement manufacture in the Kentish region, has played a significant role in the growth and development of Tasmania and will continue to be a feature of the Museum for the education of future generations.

The volunteer curators were provided with training to help in the handling of items, cleaning and display preparation. This gave donors a degee of comfort knowing that correct practices in the storage and display of items will protect the collection into the future.

Assistance provided by Arts Tasmania through the Roving Curator Program has been invaluable to this group in developing the knowledge and skill to carry out the work.

A strong working relationship with the Kentish Men's Shed has also been of great benefit to the volunteer group.



Council GM focuses on customers

Kentish Council will conduct a customer satisfaction survey this month to gather feedback from a sample of ratepayers about its services

General manager Jason Browne said the survey was part of council's increased focus on customers and community.

"It's not just people using our playgrounds and our recreation areas," he said. "Council is quite diverse in our service offering."

The joint Latrobe and Kentish GM, who has been in the role since June last year, says he adopts a collaborative management style and is a keen listener.

"It's important we continue to engage with the community so that we can bring people along on the journey," he said. "We want to bring people together, keep them healthy, connected, and provide services locally. It's about creating a good social space that people want to live in."

Part of that will be reviewing Council's land use planning strategy which was last completed in 2016.

"This is about how we strategically want development to occur," Mr Browne said. "Where we reserve residential, commercial, and industrial land zones and making sure all of those elements work together in a positive way."

Also a focus for the first half of 2025 is updating the Council Strategy with the current strategy (2014 to 2024) needing a refresh. "That will in turn help guide decision making."

Council's Economic Development Strategy will be updated, helping generate sustainable growth and development.

Mr Browne said Council will invite input from the community, including Kentish and Latrobe Independent Business Association (KaLIBA), to explore and prioritise the many strategic opportunities available in our region.

With an increased focus on community and customer experiences, "we're reviewing our systems and processes and the data we capture to support decision making".

"Better quality data and more of it, particularly around our assets and our services, will allow us to better manage the community requests that come in and analyse some of the information that supports better service delivery and asset management."

"We will be going out to the community shortly to engage with what we're proposing there.

"These assets are really services to the community. Markets and all those social gatherings happen because we've got quality assets and facilities and infrastructure for people to facilitate those gatherings."


Mr Browne said it was pleasing that kerbside waste had reduced by nearly 6% since the introduction of the FOGO system, with FOGO waste representing close to 37% of total waste.

"Minimising waste is important for our region as it is globally, which is why we will be developing a Waste Minimisation and Reduction Strategy over the first half of 2025," he said.

"The strategy will identify initiatives and help guide decision making to support minimising waste across our region, including how we work with our neighbours."

On the immediate horizon is the national rowing championships at Lake Barrington at the end of March and Mr Browne said it was important for Council to help make sure "visitors are able to get out and enjoy our wonderful region while visiting the national championships".

Providing accommodation for the 4000-5000 people anticipated to be attending the event is a challenge and council is helping coordinate options with locals and across the region.


Congratulations to all these recipients. Thank you for all you do to make Kentish a beautiful place to live and for making many connections with other residents through various groups and organisations.

Rowing comp to attract thousands

Lake Barrington, nestled in Tasmania's stunning natural landscape, is a venue of historical importance to the rowing community. With a legacy that includes hosting nine national championships and the World Rowing Championships in 1990, it remains a treasured site for athletes and spectators alike.

The lake's world-class infrastructure, including its eight fully buoyed lanes and a held start system, ensures competitors race in optimal conditions while surrounded by the beauty of the Tasmanian wilderness.

The championships will feature a packed week of activities, beginning with training sessions over the long weekend of March 22-23. Racing will officially commence on March 24, culminating on March 30 with the King's and Queen's Cups Interstate Regatta, the pinnacle of the event.

Schools from across Australia will also descend on Lake Barrington to participate in competitive rowing, adding to the vibrant and inclusive atmosphere.

With more than 2000 athletes, 500 support staff and 300 volunteers expected, #ARC25 is poised to be one of the largest sporting events in Tasmania this year.

Spectator numbers are anticipated to peak at 5000 during the final weekend, creating an electric atmosphere both on and off the water. The economic impact of the championships will be felt across the Kentish region, as the influx of visitors bolsters local businesses.

Accommodation providers, restaurants, cafes, and shops are set to benefit from increased patronage.

Rowing Australia is encouraging businesses to extend their operating hours to meet the demand of visitors seeking meals, refreshments and unique shopping experiences.

Races will commence at approximately 8am and conclude between 5pm and 7pm with visitors passing through before, during and after the event. The trade village at the venue will offer opportunities for local enterprises to showcase their products and services, ensuring a tangible connection between the event and the local community.







The Swap is organised by the Kentish Garden Club but open to all. 



ENVIRONMENTAL CORNER

Near the Devonport rubbish transfer station is a small enclave home to feral chickens. Riding my bike towards it, someone straddled across their bike was intermittently bending up and down My first thought was 'eggs,' and there must have been many, so I believed until drawing nearer brought a smile to my face. No eggs, only pieces of wind-blown litter more likely from the transfer station.

Mike can be found in his routine daily cycle ride along many of the urban pathways picking up litter and carrying it away on his bike. He fumes at just how much litter is discarded from vehicles, buildings, and where I met him, outside the transfer station.

In Sheffield, I had a long chat with Leoni Read group leader of 14 caring volunteers dedicated to keeping Kentish litter-free. We trundle along a bridle track which looked very clean however in no time, stated Leoni, we will be back to clean up other people's mess.

Litter is simply pieces of rubbish that have been left lying on the ground often in public places. Although there has been a vast improvement with fewer cigarette butts and chewing gum, it has been largely replaced by different forms of plastic. Anything from cutlery, fast food containers, bottles, syringes, and garden bags. In Australia, 7 billion tonnes of rubbish litter our roadsides, while waste in general 100,00 tonnes become litter. And not forgetting that land-based litter also affects our marine environments.

So why do we still litter? Some litter is a form

of protest or expression of frustration and feeling disconnected from their

environment. In other words, having no sense of ownership of parks, walkways, or other public spaces.

Other litterbugs have a penchant for not being inconvenienced and an unreasonable selfish belief in personal freedom. (How many times have you seen a driver throw litter out of their window?) Some are simply too lazy to take home their rubbish or there may be a lack of bins or, if the presence of litter exists, why not join in?

Plastic litter is mainly found in schools and according to 'Clean Up Australia National Rubbish Report' data, volunteers picked up 79% of litter on school grounds. And surprisingly one of the least known is slack law enforcement by agencies.

Litter of course comes in all shapes and materials. It can cause health and safety issues as we know. These include being a fire hazard, attracting pests and disease, it can clog up creeks, drains, and sewers, and contributes to pollution in general.

Who is more likely to litter may surprise you. Men for example are more likely, and the cohort age groups from 12 -14 and over 50 are the most likely offenders. However, research shows the most intentional (wilful) by far are between 18 to 34.

Littering is impossible to eradicate because as a behaviour it is easy to do and quickly out of sight. However, strategies can be put into place and that will depend on cost factors, a willingness to make changes, and better use of education, awareness, and engagement.

This includes local businesses, councils, social media hot spots (e.g use of videos), improved regulation and enforcement, specific targeting programs (eg. primary schools), improved recycling, and use of volunteers, especially for Sunday, March 2, Clean-up Australia Day.

Finally, a big thank you to the people who walk the trails, the streets, the alley-ways, and wander the countryside picking up the litter thrown out of vehicles or blown from buildings.



Improving access to health services

The Access 2 Health Services Project for Kentish has been in full swing for a very busy nine months, and we're going into 2025 without slowing down!

You may have noticed that there was no Health Services Calendar in January/February editions of *The Kentish Voice*, and no Health Services Update PDF e-mailed out. The reason for this is that we are focusing on getting the Kentish Health Services Access Improvement Plan into its final draft stage before the Kentish Health Advisory Group provides feedback (end of January) and gives it the go-ahead to move into the community consultation period (mid-February).

What is the Kentish Health Services Access Improvement Plan? Over the past nine months, we have carried out feedback/ consultation surveys, interviews, feedback sessions, and brainstorming workshops with local community members/ groups and service providers on how we can improve access to health services in our region, particularly for our most vulnerable populations.

The Kentish Health Advisory Group used the data gathered to identify what services and resourcing we already have in the

area, what the community feels we are missing, what could be done better, and what is working well.

The Group looked at common positive themes that community members said they associated with 'health' and 'healthy' living, creating a Community Vision statement for our municipality.

The Plan also includes recommendations for allocation of potential funding to the area from the Department of Health, focusing on place-based and place-focused initiatives. That means, programs and projects that our community have identified a need for, to improve our access to health services, and to live a healthy life.

Sheffield casts a spell on generations

Let the mountain of Roland shine in all its glory Let the miners talk about their ever-pending glory Of plateaus and farmyards they gather every day Fill their lungs with soot to feed a family in decay And the fleas upon nail heads dance in the farmers barn Farmers wives lop a chook's head while they spin an Aussie yarn Sprouts of opium smother valleys of greater yield There's even Paradise in the rolling hills of Sheffield And the compressor groans as it has for decades all the more As milking cows and gathering clouds a farmer can't ignore As rabbits dart from their warren to make it to the creek All the colours of a rainbow seen plus a golden streak And the dirt track winds along to the mansion of decay Echoes of our ancestors, draught horses and their drays Gumboots replace Sunday's best so toiling had resumed Harvesting before the rains under shadows of the moon And the flies attack the pads near the newly dairy born

First settlers along Lower Beulah

Lower Beulah Rd begins under Mt Gog where it separates from Beulah Rd and follows the Minnow River downstream until it joins the Dasher River at the bottom of the Kentish Bridle Track hill. First it passes through the heart of the Minnow goldfield, which was intensely mined, leaving behind many concealed shafts and tunnels.

On the north side of the Minnow River, a site was surveyed for the Minnow township, but it was never settled. The Minnow mining boom was short-lived. A score of prospecting parties took out mining licences but were disappointed with their results, most losing money. When the **Star of the West Co** tunnels found no gold reef, the mine closed at the end of 1882.

Augustus (Gus) Jessop (15) found a damp box of detonators in the old mine site and put one in his pocket to play with. After a couple of weeks, it dried out and exploded in his left hand, blowing off his thumb and two fingers. It was a long wagon ride to Deloraine's doctor to get his injuries treated.

For three weeks in Jan 1893, **Chas Manning** and **George Edwards** had been sinking a shaft at the Minnow. George Edwards (24) was digging at the bottom of the shaft when he felt overcome with toxic fumes and signalled to be hauled up in the bucket. Edwards put one foot into the bucket and held onto the rope but, six inches from the top, lost his grip and fell 40ft back down the shaft to his death. Today this entire goldfield is covered by pine plantation.

Lower Beulah's first settlement

About 1882 Edward (Ted) & Christiana Sharman (7 chn) crossed the Mersey River to become the first real settlers at Lower Beulah. They purchased 54 acres along Dynan's Bridge Rd. Several of Ted's married brothers followed, including Charles & Isabella Sharman (10 chn), Fred & Emma Sharman (10 chn) and Edis & Ann Sharman (2 chn). Ted & Charles Sharman both served on the Beulah Road Trust. In 1903 Ted & Christiana moved with their son Ben Sharman to Watts Rd, Paradise.

854 Lower Beulah Rd: In 1885 Thomas & Mary Ann Jessop arrived next with Anna (25), Clara (22), Alfred (20), Mary Ann (18), Augustus (14) and Cecil (11). Thomas Jessop selected 200 acres at the junction of Lower Beulah Rd and Dynan's Bridge Rd, where he built their house, Palmerville (after Mary's maiden name), close to the Minnow River. In 1890 Thos Jessop became chairman of the first Beulah Trust. He lost two yoked bullocks down a mine shaft. The Jessop family was very clever, with strong Christian convictions. Their daughters became schoolteachers; their three sons were all literary and mechanically minded. Alfred Jessop m Mary Sharman in 1886 but had no children.

In 1888 Alfred built Beulah's first sawmill, where he and brother Cecil invented a way for their two vertical pitsaws to be powered by a steam engine. Alfred moved to Scottsdale and opened an engineering works where he built the district's first steam-powered motor vehicle. Gus Jessop who lost half his hand as a teenager, became a schoolteacher. Later he joined the printing office of the Seventh Day Adventist magazine *Sign of the Times* but eventually left the Adventist movement.

In 1895 Cecil Jessop brought an old printing press to Beulah to publish reading books for school children. Cecil married a Smithton girl and moved to Queensland, where he set up an engineering business. About 1908 Thomas & Mary Ann Jessop left their Palmerville property to live in Queensland.

Charles Frankcombe and cousin Wm Frankcombe from Blackwood Creek purchased blocks adjoining **Thos Jessop**, and in 1886 both married Jessop daughters. Chas & Anna Frankcombe had five children, but Vida (7) burnt to death when her cotton dress caught on fire. After Charles's wife Anna died of lung disease in 1901, he married Amelia Hooper in 1904 and moved to Paradise, but she, too, died in 1910. Wm & Mary Ann Frankcombe took over her parents' Palmerville property when the Jessops left it. Mary Ann became the local midwife for Lower Beulah. Between 1918-1922, William operated a barytes mine with ore sent to the EZCo in Hobart. Wm Francombe (70) d1933, Mary Ann d1966 in her 100th year. William's grandson Tom & wife Irene (McCarthy) Frankcombe succeeded his grandfather at Palmerville. Tom leased 2000 acres on Gog Range and, for a time, ran a sawmill. After Tom Frankcombe died, Gary Huett purchased the Palmerville property, then renovated probably the oldest house in Beulah and rented it out.

About 1900 **Edward (Ned) Hooper** (24) from Blackamoore bought 50 acres on the east side of Francombe's property. He was joined by his widowed mother, **Eliza Hooper**, and his two married brothers, **Arthur** and **Alfred**. In Aug 1911, Eliza (73), having bought her groceries at Best's store, walked back to Lower Beulah in the rain, only to find the Minnow River in flood. She was forced to spend a cold, wet night on the bank.

Lower Beulah Post Office & Shop

The first Beulah PO was opened at Lower Beulah on 15 Oct 1887 in Mrs Clara Sharman's home. The mail-carrying contract from Dunorlan to Lower Beulah was held by Thomas Jessop (1887–1895) and Ed (Ted) Sharman (1895–1904). In 1904 the mail delivery route changed to come from Railton via Lowe's Bridge to the Beulah township. Clara Sharman's PO was renamed the Lower Beulah Post Office. Two years after Beulah farmers **Gilbert & Bernice Loone** opened their shop at Lower Beulah, the PO was transferred to their shop. Gilbert Loone ran the shop/PO from 1918 till Aug 1921, **Claude Campbell** till May 1943 and **Millie Oliver** till Mar 1971, when it closed.

Lower Beulah school was built by Sheffield builder **Arthur Bailey** on land donated by Gilbert Loone almost opposite his shop/post office. It was opened in 1917 with 17 children, which quickly rose to 24. The first teacher was **Miss Irene Townsend**, daughter of the manager of the Shepherd & Murphy Mine at Moina. She remembered the ink freezing in the ink wells. Irene boarded with Mrs Wm Frankcombe and married her son **Kit Frankcombe**. The school closed in 1942 and became a private residence. On 29 Aug 1998, **Roly McCarthy** lost his life in the old schoolhouse when it burnt down.

Dawkins Rd (originally Sharman & Birchalls Rd)

This road cut straight through Charles Sharman's & Geo Sharman's properties to reach the surveyed Minnow township site; its three main streets were named Sharman, Jessop and Birchall. Young **Henry Birchall**, managing director of Launceston's oldest bookselling firm, had purchased a 152-acre property adjoining the Minnow township, but in July 1894 died aged 36 of lung disease. His unmarried brother **Frank Birchall**, also a company director, took over the Beulah property, but in 1907 he died aged 45 of typhoid. Later **Tas von Steiglitz** and **Maurice Dawkins** farmed along this road.

694, 734 & 765 Lower Beulah: About 1966, **Keith & Marj** (**Hooper**) **Huett** (5 chn) moved from Dynan's Bridge Rd onto

part of 250 acres previously purchased by Keith's father, **Arthur Huett**. Keith & Marj's three sons, **Leslie (Tommy), Neville (Shorty) and Gary**, helped develop their dairy/cattle farm. Gary & Veronica Huett built a new house at 694 Lower Beulah Rd, while Tommy & Mavis lived at 734 Lower Beulah Rd. Tommy was active with the Beulah Hall committee for over 40 years and as chief fire brigade officer.

Sharmans Rd

In 1906 Fred & Emily (Hodgkinson) Duncan purchased William Hoare's 112-acre property on the top side of Sharmans Rd. In his early days, Fred leased a 50-acre cattle run on top of Mt Gog. After Fred Duncan (68) d1939, Emily moved to Sheffield and became a tireless worker for the Church of England. Son Allan & wife Valerie Duncan took over his father's farm.

Augustus & Sarah von Stieglitz came from Avoca to Lower Beulah in 1903 with three sons: Tasman (1880–1928), James (1882–1929) & Owen b1892. Sarah died 1913 and Augustus in 1928. Tasman von Stieglitz m Henrietta Sharman in 1909 and had one child, Trevor. In 1905 James held the state record for the number of field peas found on one stalk. His winning stalk had 272 pods containing 1088 peas.

After **Owen & Florence von Stieglitz** married in 1921, they purchased Duck Marsh Farm along old Paradise Rd. Trevor Von Stieglitz became a trapper and snarer on Mt Gog, averaging about 3000 skins each year.

George & Hannah (Dodd) Edwards from Lowe's Bridge took up 94 acres up Sharmans Rd. A road overseer for the Kentish council, George was justly proud of his six sons (James, George, Charles, William, Albert & Harold Edwards) who volunteered for the AIF in WWI. George died in 1924, aged 66. Most of Edward's children moved to the mainland.

Harry & Myra Frankcombe raised their family at Ivanhoe off Sharman's Rd where youngest daughter Barbara (b1935) won her Diploma of Music at age 14 and a scholarship to Melbourne Conservatorium in 1954. Sharman's Rd was named when Frank & Elvie Sharman farmed up this road.

629 Lower Beulah Rd, Oma: Frank & Mary Ann Hodgkinson, with eight children, came to Upper Beulah about 1890. For a period, Frank Hodgkinson acted as chairman of the Beulah Road Trust. Frank's immigrant father, **Joseph** Hodgkinson, died soon after settling in Westbury, leaving behind his young wife **Frances** with three small children: **Frank, Tom & Mary Ann**.

One year later, **Frances Hodgkinson** (24) married **Victor Newton** (25), grandson of **John Newton**, English author of the famous hymn *Amazing Grace*.

Frank was raised in a blended family of three Hodgkinson and eight Newton children. Two of Frank's sons, **Ernest & Walter** Hodgkinson, went to the Boer War, where, after Walter's horse broke its leg, he was captured, tied to a wagon-wheel in a Boer village and abused by the locals. During the night, a compassionate young woman brought him food to eat and cut him free. Several sons settled around Beulah, including **Arthur & Lydia Hodgkinson** who farmed this Oma property. They were followed by son Fergus & Lissel Hodgkinson who in Sept 2006 sold out and moved to Sheffield.

555 Lower Beulah Rd: A gospel hall was erected on this junction of Lower Beulah Rd with Beulah Back Rd after combining two separate Sunday schools. One had begun in

Mrs Clara Jackson's dining room at Bulls Plain in 1928, the other started in the Lower Beulah school in 1931. Land was purchased from Victor Walker and a 30ftx17ft hall was opened in Oct 1935 by Hugh McNeilly. A group of Beulah Christians began monthly worship services there from Feb 1937. After 50 years, the Sunday services finished in 1984/85 when the building was sold and moved to Tommy Huett's property. In its place, Kerry & Debbie Huett relocated a house from Tullah.

528 Lower Beulah Rd: About 1920 George & Hilda (von Stieglitz) McCarthy moved to Lower Beulah Rd where they raised their large family: Ernie, Joan, Irene, Roly, Aileen, Jim, Athol, Frank, Barbara & Harvey. A family of axemen, they felled trees for the sawmillers. George McCarthy won the 1922 championship chop in Devonport, while sons Ernie & Roly won trophies at Henley-on-Mersey. In Sept 1950 George and son Ernie built the Beulah Memorial Hall.

When George McCarthy moved to Railton, German immigrants **Helmut & Erika Kursawe** purchased his property about 1970. After his Kursawe parents passed on, Helmut Jr & wife Judy (Huett) Kursawa moved from Nook to Lower Beulah in 2016 and built themselves a new house in 2019.

Further north along Lower Beulah Rd, **James & Clara Jackson** settled at Bulls Plain where they also raised a large family. James (67) d1926 & Clara Jackson (77) d1935. Son James Jr & Gladys Jackson took over the property.

496 Lower Beulah Rd: Originally owned by **Bert Hardy** and later the Jacksons, this property has been recently purchased by Italian Remedial Massage Therapist **Diego Pellegrini** whose professional services are in great demand. Further down Lower Beulah Rd, we enter pine plantations, so let's double back and conclude our survey by travelling west along Beulah Back Rd to the Beulah township.

90 Beulah Back Rd: About 1880 James & Ellen Murphy from Deloraine purchased 298 acres on the south side of Beulah Back Road where they raised their seven children. Three Murphys married three Gannons from Ashgrove, Elizabeth Town. Son James Jr & Ann (Gannon) Murphy moved to Circular Head, and his brother Jack became a publican. Jack's grandson Graeme Murphy founded the famous Sydney Dance Company. Wasyl & Katerina Jedyn from Poland/Ukraine purchased this property in the 1950s. They were naturalised in Nov 1959. Chn: Peter, Ray, John & Mary (Mrs Tony Spillane). Today Ray & Veronica Jedyn farm two Beulah properties.

63 Beulah Back Rd: Levick & Emmie Spillane bought this property from the McCarthys about 1944 and raised their three sons **Tony & Robin** (twins) and **Neil** there, who all purchased their own Beulah Rd farms in the 1960s. Levick died 1984. Since Emmie died in 1996, Tony's son **Nigel Spillane** took over the farm. This means since 1897, five generations of the Spillane family have continuously farmed properties in Beulah for 128 years, which could be a record.

Today the Beulah district is entirely surrounded by great swathes of pine plantations. There are currently no Sharmans, Hodgkinsons, McCarthys, Jacksons or von Steiglitzs. Like so many other country districts, neither are there now any schools, churches or shops.

But today's Beulah residents do have a pleasant memorial hall to remember their past and a well-equipped fire station to protect their future.








