A salute to Railton's veteran volunteer

Tony "Tige" Lowe August 21, 1954 - December 14, 2024

Tige was volunteer site manager for Taste of the North West from 2010 through to 2024. His approach was generally to listen politely until asked to speak, then provide a compelling argument for what he thought needed to happen (he was always right) before sitting quietly through the rest of the meeting.

His role included mapping out the stall locations, ensuring that each stall had access to their power requirements, organising the large marquees that were used in the early years, organising the generators and ensuring that the event had access to water and rubbish bins among other things. He eventually added Deputy Dawg, a rather thankless volunteer role, despite King George V Park's permanent "dog free" signs.

The Taste of the North West Committee has a meal together at the end of their meetings and this provided an opportunity for Tige to spin a yarn or three about Railton and its characters. Having lived in Railton for most of his life, he had plenty of amusing anecdotes including the relationship between the eccentric hermit Norman Sykes and "those wretched young Lowes" (Tige and his older brothers) who lived nearby.

He loved to wander down the main street for his newspaper on

a Saturday morning and would chat with many people on the way there and back.

When parkrun started in Railton in 2017, we invited Tige to join the volunteer crew and he helped out on numerous occasions in one of the three marshall positions. He also volunteered for other organisations, including the Sheffield Men's Shed, Devonport Show and at the Henley on the Mersey event.



Tige's outstanding community service was to scouting where he earned recognition as a scout leader, district leader and beyond.

Many others in the community could add to his list of accomplishments as a volunteer and also in his working life.

Tony passed away on December 14, 2024, aged 70 and will be remembered fondly for his humourous tales, his problem solving and his quiet dedication to anything he took on.

Harp concert features renowned musician

Tutor Mon/Tue/Weds will be Kate Fraser and Tasmanian Harp Society guest tutor Andy Rigby will be the tutor for the Workshop on the Thursday that week.

Workshop participants will be taught tunes and invited to perform at the concert in the Sheffield Town Hall on January 19, along with harpists from the Tasmanian Harp Society.

A three-day weekend workshop will be held in the Town Hall from January 17-19 with the concert, run by The Tasmanian Harp Society, to be held in the afternoon.

The workshop tutor will again be Victorian Harpist and harp

maker, Andy Rigby. Andy is a wellknown identity in the Australian Folk scene. Multi-instrumentalist, Andy performs and teaches at leading festivals around Australia as well as running his own harp camp. Andy is one of Australia's leading designers, makers, players and teachers of the harp in its Celtic and Latin American Form. Don't miss an opportunity to see Andy perform.

The harp concert will be at 2pm on Sunday, January 19.

This year's Sheffield FlowerFEST will be held during the first weekend of February at Sheffield Town Hall.

Organisers from Kentish Garden Club are urging all gardeners to enter the show with cut flowers, potted plants and homegrown fruit and vegetables from their garden.

A flower show is only successful if many people take part and display their plants and flowers to fill the Town Hall with colour and fragrance. While it is nice to take home a winner's certificate, ribbon or even a cash prize, being part of a flower show is about more than winning. It is a chance to celebrate a community event that brings joy to all.

Each year more than 600 people visit FlowerFEST to admire and be inspired by the floral displays. There's also music, plant stalls, garden items and a mega raffle.

Help and advice on offer

If you've never exhibited in a flower show before, don't worry. Club members are on hand to help you set up your exhibit. Have a look at the 'Show Program' on the Kentish Garden Club website (kentishgardenclub.com.au) or pick one up from Sheffield Post Office or De Couer in Main Street, Sheffield, to see the categories you can enter from dahlias, roses and other summer flower to flower arrangements and potted plants.

Categories include foliage, fruit and vegetables and a children's section

Bring along your best entries to be part of the show on Friday, January 31, from 3-6pm. Make sure the entries are in good health and in peak condition. A good tip is to pick the entry the



evening before and plunge it into water, so it is well hydrated. Individual blooms should be displayed in small glass bottles (such as a small apple cider bottle) but there are also entries in containers as well as categories for potted plants.

What you need to complete your entry (such as an exhibitor number, display bottles and stickers) is available at the Sheffield Town Hall on Friday, January 31, from 3-6pm or on Saturday, February 1, from 7.30-8.30am.

The show is opens to the public from 10am-3pm on Saturday and Sunday. Entry to the show is \$4 (children under 16 free). Prizes are presented and the raffle is drawn at 2.30pm on Sunday afternoon.

Decorate your gate!



Historic club pads up for next innings

The Beulah Bushrangers Cricket Club is one of the few foundation members of the 1890s Kentish Cricket Association still operating – but its future is uncertain.

The Davey family has been associated with the club for more than 45 years and is determined the Bushrangers will survive. Club president Craig Davey plays alongside his son and grandson, continuing the family tradition.

"We're a family-based club and we are a family, we're a cricketing family. Loyalty is what keeps our club going," he said.

Weekend commitments, shift work and the declining participation rates in cricket has meant the team had to forfeit a match due to lack of numbers recently. Craig posted a shout-out on Facebook and two new players have since joined the squad.

"We had two teams last year and we've only got one this year which we're struggling to fill at times," he said. "We need to have a bigger squad."

Craig's 12-year-old grandson James debuted for the club last month while son Chris is the Vice President and cousin Brendon coaches.

"It's always been difficult for Beulah Cricket Club because there's no population base," Craig said. "We're at Railton."

In the 1930s it was an all Dawkins team – 10 brothers and their father. The Daveys moved into the district in the 1940s and were an integral part of the team into the 1950s until the club folded due to a lack of numbers.

"Beulah Cricket Club is part of my DNA," said Craig.



Playing for 50 years and president for more than 40, he reformed the team in 1979 aged just 18 in honour of his uncle Charlie.

"He had a bat in his hand when he died. He was only 49. I spoke to him about reforming the old club and he reckoned it was a great idea and then when he died it inspired me further."

Friends and family with plenty of cricket talent among them came together to make it happen.

When the Kentish Cricket Association folded after more than 100 years, the Bushrangers joined the Mersey Valley Cricket Association in 2010. Based at Railton Recreation Ground on Native Rock Road, training is held on Wednesdays from 6pm.

"We've got a predominantly young team at the moment so that's a good thing," Craig said.

Free AEDs save lives

Applications are now open for the latest round of the Community Defibrillator Fund, with an additional 180 lifesaving devices to be made available through the Tasmanian Government's \$500,000 investment.

The new fund will boost the availability of publicly accessible Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) across the State, recognising that early access to an AED during a cardiac arrest can save lives.

Health Minister Jacquie Petrusma said community groups, businesses and individuals can apply for a free AED, with applications encouraged from rural and regional areas.

"When someone has a cardiac arrest, their chance of survival declines by almost 10 per cent with each passing minute, and having access to an AED can mean the difference between life and death," she said.

After a device is placed in the community, it will be findable through the GoodSAM Responder phone app, which alerts nearby registered responders and provides the location of patients and the closest AED.





But while our group has had a successful year, we also had to admit defeat and split our group due to a lack of leaders. Our scout section is now aligned with Devonport.


I know I sound like a broken record, but we need leaders to continue functioning within the Kentish



Culverts protect aquatic wildlife



Living in Kentish, we are blessed with plentiful water bodies and a rich diversity of

wildlife. Many landowners have dams and small creeks which are home to platypus (*Ornithorhynchus anatinus*) and perhaps Giant Freshwater Crayfish (*Astacopsis gouldi*).

Both these species have been seen crossing local roads, for reasons we can only speculate. In some situations, there are no culverts or bridges and in other cases there are culverts, but for a variety of reasons they are not accessible, or are not appealing, putting animals at risk of being run over.

Observations across Tasmania over many years have shown that platypus, in particular, seem to prefer to bypass culverts and cross the road instead, which means mortality on Tasmanian roads can be quite significant at a local level.

Populations of platypus occupying minor water courses are often small, with individuals foraging over large areas. Their home range can be up to 5km, and they have been reported to forage over several kilometres per day. This means these platypuses may have to negotiate several road crossings a day. Examples of at-risk populations in our local area include Sheffield Road between Melrose and Roscrea Roads and near the Barrington Road turn off; and on Barrington Road, just east of the village.

A number of platypus have been run over at each of these locations.

Platypus usually cross roads at dawn or on dusk, and being dark in colour they can be very hard to see, making them vulnerable to passing traffic. There have been a number of deaths in our region this year, but there are things we can do. Be mindful when driving in areas with water bodies near the road and slow down at dusk and dawn.

Risks can also be higher around April to June when juveniles move out of home and go looking for a range of their own.

There are fewer recorded observations of giant freshwater crayfish crossing roads, and there is a dearth of research on the reasons they cross the road and how to mitigate risks from cars.

After a sighting of a giant freshwater crayfish on the road at Paradise, Mount Roland Land Care (MRLC) together



with Kentish Council, did some preliminary work with culvert modification to make it easier for crayfish to move through them. Subsequently MRLC successfully applied for a Landcare Australia Community Grant to build on

this early work. It is a very competitive grant program, so we are very excited to be able to build on our earlier work.

Our success highlights the importance of protecting this species, which is listed as vulnerable under both the Threatened Species Protection Act 1995 and the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999, and as endangered under the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List of Threatened Species.

This work is complementary to work being carried out by Cradle Coast NRM with landholders along the Dasher River and tributaries to restore crayfish habitat.

The aims of the MRLC project are to demonstrate ways of remediating existing culverts so they are accessible to giant freshwater crayfish (and possibly other aquatic species, including platypus); and to develop guidelines for the installation of new culverts.

In other news MRLC will be holding two seed-collecting workshops in January with younger people in mind. We are also getting ready to plant 2000 trees in 2025 as part of our 'Thousands of Trees' project and will be looking for volunteers to help with this on weekends in autumn and again in spring.

Ladybirds and hoverflies do their jobs

Robert's Gardening Tips

I had a friend drop in and we were having a look at my garden, talking about how the garden and weeds have gone crazy with all the rain and warm weather.

This year I have been allowing more time for my garden, determined to make inroads, especially in the vegetable patch.

I had planted potatoes, and they are still doing well, haven't had to water. I also planted 200 strawberry plants and have managed to keep on top of the weeds with them, so have had some wins.

But, where the grass has grown, I need a ladder to climb up to look over it, expecting to see gorillas. Luckily not.

I went to the shed to get the brushcutter and saw the chainsaw close by, mmmm. Would the chainsaw be better? Maybe not.

After using the brushcutter to cut my way into the forest walk, I was amazed to see all the growth to the native plants I put in over autumn. That made me smile, "Good".

I'm sure I'm not the only one in this position. The risk always is that the long grass can dry out, so I'm working around the property where the grass can be cut down to reduce the risk of fire.

The one part of the garden that is doing well, and I have managed to stay on top of, is the rose garden.

Earlier in September, when all the roses were starting to put on growth, I had a massive infestation of aphids. Usually I don't get a lot because I have a lot of plants that attract beneficial insects, so they tend to keep them under control.


This year was different. A couple of times I was tempted to spray Pyrethrum, but there were always lots of hoverflies and ladybirds around, so I didn't.

By late October, all the aphids were gone, the hoverflies and ladybirds had done their job, after all, everything was in place to attract them.

Every season has its own challenges and with the rain and warm weather, it's not just the weeds that are growing. This is also the conditions for pests to infest your garden, so as I get on top of weeding the garden beds, I will also be topping up the mulch to stop the cycle of weeds and pests.

ENVIRONMENTAL CORNER

We are entering the New Year with 'Environmental Corner' which has served the community these past few years with topics ranging from Adaption, Biodiversity, Climate Change, Ethics, Recycling, and much more.

My aim is to be informative, interesting, diverse, probing, and controversial when necessary and to give readers insight into local, regional, national, and global topics. If it causes conversation around the kitchen table or over a cup of coffee, all well and good. It is all part of our social education. You may not agree with me but some articles may resonate with some of you and prompt further investigation.

There has been quite a lot of academic research into the anxiety and suffering some people have over Anthropogenic Climate Change. This upsets me because tens of thousands of adults and young children feel they have little or no recourse to save our precious planet. Instead, many worry and feel isolated and abandoned. You may be one of these caring individuals, and I want to reassure you that I understand your concerns.

There are several research articles on this subject, including https://www.thelancet.com 'Climate anxiety in children and young adults' and https://www. Sciencedirect.com/science 'Climate anxiety, wellbeing, and pro-environmental action'.

For those of you who have concerns over use of plastics, from grocery bags to car seats, look no further than our oceans (*right*). Since the 1950s, more than 8bn plastics have been produced of which 10-15m has ended up in marine environments. Recently the fifth 'Intergovernmental Negotiation Committee (INC-5) on plastic pollution took place in Busan, South Korea to try and develop a mandatory treaty with plastics. The aim was not to stop using plastic (impossible in today's consumer society) but rather to reduce the amount and determine where it ends up once discarded.

As one journalist put it, the biggest producers of plastics hijacked the whole meeting with little being achieved. Read more in-depth from the HDS Earth Negotiations Bulletin Summary Report website https://enb.iisd.org

Endeavoring to show some positive outcomes by looking after living organisms on our planet can be difficult as many of us know. Passing several of our vineyards recently, I wondered why they were using pesticides in between the grape-growing

rows. Many farmers, including one of our largest horticultural producers locally, have been trialing

the more environmentally friendly 'companion planting' method. In simple terms, they deliberately plant one or more 'sacrificial plants' that repel insects (one method is the aroma given off) from the main crop such as strawberry or broccoli, thus saving the food source, the soil, and money spent on insecticide spray.

In recognition of the invisible heroes, thank you! These are the hidden people who walk the trails, walk the streets, walk the alley-ways, and wander the countryside in their own time, picking up the litter that gets thrown out of vehicles or blown from a building.

Councils cannot be expected to do all the litter pick up. Finally, there are two Tasmanian environmentalists of the year. Congratulations to Sam Elsom the founder of 'Sea Forest' which uses seaweed to reduce methane emissions from cows. This is a vital step forward in the food cycle by lowering CO2 greenhouse gasses. And congratulations to Jim Everett-puralia meenewmatta in recognition of his outstanding decades of environmental activism to protect endangered species habitats.



Disaster response plans build resilience

Biodiversity and agricultural assets will be better equipped to respond to and recover from extreme weather events and biosecurity threats following the release of comprehensive emergency management plans by Tasmania's three Natural Resource Management (NRM) bodies.

At the request of the Australian Government, NRM North, NRM South and Cradle Coast NRM have each prepared Biodiversity and Agricultural Natural Capital Emergency Preparedness, Response and Recovery Plans.

Tailored to each of Tasmania's NRM regions, the plans are the first of their kind and were developed with extensive stakeholder and expert input.

The plans aim to enhance resilience and safeguard natural assets in the event of emergencies such as floods and bushfires, and cases where flora and fauna are faced with threats to biosecurity.

The plans identify areas for action, knowledge and information gaps, and opportunities to enhance stakeholder collaboration. By identifying and assessing risks to priority biodiversity and agricultural assets within each region, the plans will strengthen stakeholder capabilities, capacity building, and strategic actions, alongside existing emergency management and recovery frameworks.

NRM South CEO Nepelle Crane said the plans are comprehensive in their long-term approach to natural disasters. "Through these plans, our long-term goal is to ensure that

natural value priorities are part of all stages of emergency management (planning, response and recovery) along with human safety and infrastructure."

NRM North Acting CEO Jenni Kew said the strategic plans consider not only the environmental impact of extreme weather events and biosecurity threats, but the financial liability as well.

"Investing in robust emergency preparedness frameworks not only enhances the resilience of Tasmania's valuable ecosystems, but also lowers long-term recovery and restoration costs, which strengthens regional economies, particularly in the tourism and agriculture sectors," she said.

Cradle Coast NRM Manager Bonnie Bonneville said the plans will help safeguard the region's natural and agricultural assets.

"These plans aim to mitigate the risk and minimise the damage to our region's biodiversity assets and agricultural landscapes so they can recover quickly and sustainably from natural disasters," she said.

"Collaboration across all stakeholders has been key to their development."

NRM South, NRM North and Cradle Coast NRM would like to thank the stakeholders who supported the development of the plans and look forward to progressing strategic work stemming from the plans in the future.

Early Pioneers along Beulah Roa

After leaving the Kentish Bridle Track corner, Beulah Rd brings you firstly to the Dasher River where a lot of prospecting for gold took place. **Thomas & Harriett Redford**, later **Herb & Millie Oliver** lived there. **Vern Frankcombe** had a sawmill here, followed by **Wayne Weeks**. Part way up the Dasher hill is the entrance to The Gates to Heaven, an idyllic bush retreat catering for self-contained caravans and motor homes.

250 Beulah Rd

The first families to settle here around 1900 were James & Mary Fidler from Harford with their married sons James Jrn & Joseph Fidler. They farmed the area for over 30 years, losing two houses to fire and a draught horse that fell down a mining shaft. In 1946 Kit & Irene Frankcombe with sons Fred, Tom & Ian built their house from cement bricks made from nearby gravel pits. Kit served on the Kentish Council for some years. Son Ian & Florence Frankcombe followed his father on the farm, while grandson George & Michelle Frankcombe built up the road at 285 Beulah Rd.

413 Beulah Rd Pioneer settlers William & Mary Ann (Dalrymple) Walker took up 320acres around 1878 and built their home Beulah Heights. Sadly, Mary Ann Walker and four of their seven children died of TB, causing Wm Walker to burn the house down and build another. Joseph & Sarah Hodgkinson farmed the property until 1933, followed by son Frank & Ada Hodgkinson. Next was Peter & Marie Davenport, then in 1977 schoolteachers Rupert & Anne French until 2021. A 120acre farm was subdivided off Walker's property to become 435 Beulah Rd, owned by Olivers, Jeffries, Spillanes and since 1993 Lawrence & Gill Appleby.

West of Walkers were the properties of their Christian Brethren friends (the Austins, Cracks, Does, Eaglings, Ferrars and **Knowles**) who about 1877/78 pioneered this new district they called Beulah. On John & Albert Austins's property they erected a small gospel hall/school which served their needs for 30 years. Another of Austin Bros's paddocks became their North Beulah Cricket ground, where the first competitive cricket match was played against South Sunnyside on 30 Nov 1889. Over the following decades, these North Beulah pioneers experienced a problem we see repeated time and time again throughout the Beulah community - a general exodus of Beulah families to better farms closer to markets. When the group's leader James Knowles died in 1899, of his eight sons, only the oldest John & wife Mary remained in Beulah. After their 'Gospel Hall' was hauled to Paradise in 1916, John continued their church fellowship in his home until 1921 when his family also moved away.

From Beulah Heights corner, the original Beulah Rd ran westward along the northern boundary of Wm Walker's property, continuing along the present Golden Gate Rd to the corner of John Austin's property. There it turned south and ran down his western boundary, through Ferrar's farm to the future township of Beulah. This section of road contained a notoriously steep decline, up which farmers found it almost impossible to haul their produce to market. So a deviation road was constructed in 1889 from the end of Walkers property, diagonally down across the Austin and Ferrars properties with a more gradual decline direct to the Beulah township.

494 Beulah Rd

John & Albert Austin sold this property in 1903 to **Charles** & Alice Kelly who built their Hilltop house halfway along

this new deviation road. The farm was purchased by **Edis** & **Elizabeth Sharman**, followed by son **Eric & Beatrice** Sharman. Last occupant was well-known and intelligent Beulah identity **Colin Sharman** (1910-1997) who wore an eye patch after being blinded in one eye by cricket ball when he was 15. His mother **Louisa Sharman** was a nurse at the Mersey General Hospital and confirmed to her family, Colin's father was Dr Walpole. The property is now owned by Lawrence & Gill Appleby's son-in-law **Mark Chopping**.

633 Beulah Rd

After marrying in 1890, Richard & Eliza (Webb) Dawkins settled on this property with his widowed mother Catherine Dawkins. Richard's brother David Dawkins and his sister Martha (Mrs Joseph Spillane) both settled on nearby properties. Richard lived all his life at Beulah, had nine children and died in September 1938 in his 70th year.

Beulah Township

The first Beulah Road Trust was formed in 1890, comprising **Thomas Jessop** (chairman) **Ed (Ted) Sharman, Edward Anderson, George Stephens** and **John Cooper**. For the first 10 years they met at Clara Sharman's PO at Lower Beulah. But in 1900 after a public hall was built in the township, they moved their monthly meeting there. The Beulah Road Trust continued until the new Kentish Municipal Council was formed on 1 Jan 1908.

State School: In 1893 the government promised the Beulah people a proper school with teacher's residence. Nothing was done until 1896 when **Gideon Robson** of Sheffield erected a temporary 18ft x 22ft weatherboard building which proved to be totally inadequate. Four year later in 1900 a substantial school teacher's residence was erected by Devonport builder **George Levy** but still no permanent school. Finally, **C Adams & Sons** built the new long-awaited school for £187 which opened 5 Aug 1907.

This school served the community for over 30 years before closing in Dec 1941 after which all Beulah children were bussed to the new Sheffield area school. Later the Beulah school itself was also relocated to Sheffield. The only building remaining on site was the multi-chimneyed schoolhouse, where its most illustrious school-teacher occupant **Joseph Lyons**, later Prime Minister of Australia, lived in 1909.

When Eric Sharman was appointed school-bus driver to Sheffield, he & wife Beatrice Sharman with **Rex, Chloris, Baden & Geraldine** moved there; the Government selling them the old schoolhouse in 1954. **Baden Sharman** played 28 years of Coastal A Grade Cricket, including 18 years as captain/coach of Sheffield, Railton, Latrobe, and 14 games for Tasmania against interstate and international cricket teams.

Memorial Hall: The first public hall built by **James Cooper** was officially opened in Nov 1900. Fifty years later, Beulah's new Memorial Hall replaced it in Sept 1950 with a gala ball and the unveiling of the soldier's memorial plaque listing 30 local names. Built by **George McCarthy** and son **Ernie**, it cost about £1200.

Beulah became one of the first districts in the whole of Tasmania to complete their local war memorial. Inside this building in Jan 1954, they switched on the electricity for Beulah district. In March 1962, the Hall was burnt down by a Beulah resident apparently because his wife enjoyed attending the dances, but he didn't. The present hall was built by **George Mansell** and opened 8 September 1967.

Beulah PO & Shops: In 1903 a committee was formed to have the Beulah PO removed from Mrs Clara Sharman's remote location to a more central position where most people now lived. Under the existing system, mail was brought from the Dunorlan railway station to Mrs Sharman PO where twice a week she sent one mailbag four miles further on to Beulah State School where Miss Alice Agar distributed it. The new alternative was to establish a Post Office in the Beulah township and get daily deliveries from Railton. On 1 Jun 1904, five months after Ed (Ted) & Alice Best opened their Beulah shop opposite the school, the new Beulah PO was established in their shop and Mrs Clara Sharman's original PO was recommissioned as the Lower Beulah PO. Beulah postmistresses were Alice Best to March 1933, Myrtle Febey to June 1967, Thelma Bramich to Dec 1978, Judith Winwood until it closed 31 Jul 1975. A telephone service to Beulah was installed in 1911. Myrtle's husband Bert Febey had lost his left leg, left arm and all but a thumb and one figure on his other hand in a quarry blasting accident in 1932. Not only did he maintain the mail run to Sheffield but served as JP.

Churches: Beulah's St Matthews Anglican Church was dedicated by **Bishop Mercer** in Sept 1904. A 40ftx25ft weatherboard structure, it was built next to the state school, on land generously given by **Wm Richardson**. It lasted 40 years. The second Anglican church opened 6 April 1944 after the congregation purchased the Beulah Baptist church. Again, it was dedicated as St Matthews in June 1949 and closed in Nov 1998 when the building moved to Lenna at Forth. Earlier the Beulah Baptist church had also been built on land given by Wm Richardson and opened by **Rev Britton** in Dec 1913. Closed in 1944, its seats, organ and pulpit were given to the new Paradise Baptist church after the previous church was destroyed by fire.

Settlers close to Beulah Township

In 1888 several sons of Henry & Emma Cooper from Lowes Bridge's PO became pioneer settlers adjacent to the future Beulah township. John & wife Elizabeth bought the first horse drawn vehicle to Beulah; James built their first public hall. John & James served on the Beulah Road Trust. 'Cooper's track' that connected Beulah with Lower Beulah Rd was later renamed Beulah Back Rd. This property was bought by Wm & Emma Richardson and called Brookhead. He bought the first steam engine to Beulah and hired the first gang of harvesters. In 1910 Richardson bought the first motor car, a 20-hp Ford in Beulah. He sold out in April 1948. After farming there David Rayner sold the property for tree planation, but kept the house, in which Paul Rayner, Jock Morgan & Laurie Kingshott have lived.

Daveys Rd (originally McCarthys Rd)

James & Alice McCarthy came from Dunorlan about 1888 and raised their nine children at the end of this road, where a rough track continued down to Duck Marsh becoming the shortest walking distance to Sheffield. Active in the Beulah Road Trust, James McCarthy died 1911, Alice in 1917. Renamed Daveys Rd after Wm & Frances Davey with son Charles farmed on the north side of the road. Ernie Hirt P/L purchased several properties between Davey Rd and Golden Gate Rd, built the house where Allen & Win Furley lived, then sold it all out for planation timber.

Joseph & Martha (Dawkins) Spillane settled on the southern side of Davey Road about 1897 where they raised 11 children.

Martha was Beulah's midwife, then from 1912 Martha Spillane ran a maternity hospital at 123 Main St Sheffield, before moving to Wilmot in 1917. **Lambert Spillane** took over his father's Beulah farm, with wife **Emily Spillane** the next local midwife. In May 1950 **Arn & Effie Freeman** from Mathinna purchased the property.

Beulah Rd- south of the township

Shortly after the Minnow gold rush, several large bush blocks were purchased by wealthy investors. **George Ingram**'s long 320-acre block ran down the western side of Beulah Rd to Jacksons Rd corner. Eventually subdivided, the township corner block was bought by **Bert & Myrtle Febey**; later **Des & Mavis Ruttle** built a new house there. South of them, 702 Beulah Rd was owned by **John Walker, Les Brumby** and currently **Tony Spillane**. Around the corner, on the northern side **Kerry Rayner** owned Willowdene at 788 & 810 Beulah Rd, and at 852 **Brian Caldicutt** had his Earlsfield property.

Jacksons Rd was originally the route for northern miners coming to the Minnow gold fields. It was named Jacksons Rd when **Eric & Gloria Jackson** resided up this road.

789 & 855 Beulah Rd

The 322-acre estate of **Henry Bloch** (Launceston) was purchased by **David & Mary (Webb) Dawkins** and named Pine Lane, with hill at rear of their property named Dawkins Hill. David & Mary had 15 sons & 4 daughters. In the 1930s these Dawkins sons formed their own Cricket team. Son **Lewis** took 100 wickets in 1930 season. Lewis eventually bought 789 Beulah Rd, while his bachelor brother **George Dawkins** owned 855 Beulah Rd. George was once taken to Mersey Hospital, where the nurse asked: 'Do you have pyjamas, Mr Dawkins?' 'No' he replied 'I have appendicitis'.

In the late 1960s three Spillane brothers bought three prime properties along Beulah Rd. **Tony** bought 702, **Neil** bought 789, and **Robin** Spillane bought 855. As schoolboys they clearly remember their father **Levick** buying his first Massey-Ferguson tractor. This sparked in them a life-long passion to collect tractors. Beside their father's original one, today they are proud owners of 10 red well-preserved Fergie tractors.

902 Beulah Rd

German immigrant **Rudolph Wacksmuth** from Launceston named his 320a property Roland Park developing it as 30-cow dairy farm and sheep stud. About 1898 he sold out to **Sam & Martha Oliver**'s sons. Eldest son **Arthur Oliver** who served on the Beulah Road Trust d1946. In 1953 **Laurie & Rita Appleby** began leasing Roland Park, plus 80acres on the southside of Beulah Rd. For many years Laurie served as Kentish councilor and member of the Roland Lodge. Then purchased by **Kevin & Terri Appleby**, afterwards **Rodney Green**.

964 & 986 Beulah Rd

Son of a butcher, **William Moore** sold meat, dairy food and sly grog to the miners. Later owners were **Les Leonard, Eric Gardam** and **Tom & Mavis Gardam**. About 1885 **George & Mary Ann Stephens** from London purchased **Thomas Clement**'s property and established his Clyro dairy farm. George was elected to the first Beulah Road Trust in 1890. Son **William Stephens**, made JP in 1905, developed the Clyro Poultry Farm, with 600/700 head of poultry. Post WW2 **Alex Best** had his sawmill at the Minnow River.

Today this whole area is pine plantation.








Dairy Australia farewells managing director



After seven years with Dairy Australia, David Nation has made the decision to move on from his role as Managing Director and will finish in June 2025.

Dr Nation joined Dairy Australia in 2018 with extensive experience across the dairy industry, including serving as Co-Director of DairyBio and DairyFeedbase and Chief Executive Officer at Dairy Futures CRC.

Freight inquiry finds subsidies 'complex'

Tasmania's peak body for primary producers, TasFarmers welcomes the Federal Government's Senate's Select Committee Report on the Tasmanian Freight Equalisation Scheme and its recommendations.

Independent Senator Tammy Tyrell announced the completion of the committee's review, which highlights the scheme as ineffective and a deterrent to business investment in the state.

TasFarmers CEO Nathan Calman said that TasFarmers applauds the committee for completing the inquiry within just a few months, conducting multiple hearings across the state, and delivering clear and actionable recommendations for the government.

"This review gives us a pathway ahead of the federal election and this should be on the Christmas wish list of every Tasmanian primary producer," Mr Calman said.

"The review acknowledges what we have been saying for some time, that the original policy intent of the existing scheme is not currently delivering the intended outcomes."

He said the scheme was originally designed to offset the cost of crossing the Bass Strait, ensuring that Tasmanian producers are not disadvantaged.

"So that the expense of transporting goods to mainland markets

remains comparable or no different to putting the same goods on a truck and driving down the national highway," he said.

"The committee has truly listened to the industry and carefully considered the body of evidence presented. It was made overwhelmingly clear that while the current scheme is important, it is not effectively bridging the gap.

The review acknowledged that a significant part of the problem lies in the scheme's complexity and the challenges associated with making claims, which have led to it being underutilised.

"For the scheme to be effective, it must be straightforward enough for first-time users to easily make a claim"Currently, the process is so complex that producers often need to hire external support just to submit a single claim. As a result, many are not utilising the scheme in its current form."

TasFamers is advocating as part of its federal election platform that further funding be made available as a result of the recommendations and that they be funded in the next federal budget in a bipartisan way.
