EDITORIAL

Lately, I've been walking around with a black eye.

It's all purple and puffy but doesn't hurt so I tend to forget it's there and that I need to explain. "Walked into a door," I say, trying to be funny. About something that should never be treated so dismissively.

It wasn't until a friend highlighted the theme for this year's Kentish International Women's Day being *Stamp It Out*, referring to domestic violence and hosting speakers with lived experiences, that I realised no one had asked me what happened to my eye.

Several people I spoke to face to face said nothing. Perhaps not wanting to pry, perhaps not believing it could be anything other than an accident. Or perhaps not noticing.

When I offer the explanation - Pickleball incident (it's all fun and games until someone gets hit in the eye!) - some say, 'I didn't want to ask.'

But we should ask. Just as it is everyone's responsibility to protect our children and our youth, we must also watch out for the signs that someone is being abused, and it's not always as obvious as a black eye.

With one woman a week being killed by their intimate partners in Australia, it is an ugly issue that we cannot shy away from anymore.

Coercive control is one form of abuse where the partner cuts the woman off from family, friends and exerts financial control.

A law to criminalise this sort of behaviour was legislated in Queensland after the case of Hannah Clarke and her three children, who were murdered by their father. It emerged later that he had controlled every aspect of her life, from who she saw to what she wore, and when she left him, he lost all control.

I knew that man. He was my son's footy coach when we lived in Brisbane in 2009 and our families became friends. His first wife and their 12-year-old son presented as perfectly normal, although he was a bit over-zealous training the kids.

Domestic violence isn't something that happens to other people. Like cancer, most families have been touched by it, even from afar. It's the daughter-in-law who stops your son from coming to family functions; it's the old friend who keeps getting meeker and smaller under the weight of insults and criticism; it is a pattern of behavior in any relationship that is used to gain or maintain power and control over an intimate partner.

We need to watch for the signs, not just in our families and friends but in ourselves. Google 'gaslighting' for some of the red flags, for both men and women.

This is not a problem for only men to solve; we all need to play a part if we're going to *Stamp It Out*.

Still our rock: Bible Chapel turns 150

It's a little strange for a small Tasmanian country church to have its founding moments retold, a century and a half later, in the opening scene of an award-winning novel.

On a Bright Hillside in Paradise, a fictional novel by Annette Higgs, tells the story of the surprising beginning of what is now the Sheffield Bible Chapel, the first gospel hall in the Australia-New Zealand region, then on a roadside block in West Kentish. During the weekend of April 5-6, Sheffield Bible Chapel will celebrate its 150th anniversary, with the theme Still our Rock. Attractions include a photo and memorabilia display, a panel discussion and Q and A, with guests who have written and researched aspects of the Bible Chapel's history. Mayor Kate Haberle will officially open the event on Saturday at 11am.

The chapel will be open for the regular Sunday service where

everyone is welcome while there will also be opportunities to drop in and browse.

The small group of bible chapel founders gave birth to outpost gospel halls in Lorinna, Roland, Paradise, and Beulah. Gospel halls were never meant to be churches but, as the name hints, they were public buildings where all were welcome to come hear the message of Christianity.

An 1878 article in *The Examiner* by a correspondent who visited the hall on a special occasion documents a picnic held for 300 people and an evening service being given by Mrs Perrin, the widow of one of the founding visiting evangelists.

The original building was replaced in late 1920s on the same site at West Kentish. When the newly rebuilt hall and caretaker's cottage accidentally burnt down two years later in 1930, the decision to purchase land and rebuild in High Street Sheffield was made.

The current church building was completed in 1931 and named the Sheffield Gospel Hall. It was renamed the Sheffield Bible Chapel in 1981. Extensions for the murals were made in 1994.

For the 100th anniversary, historian Alan Dyer researched and published his first book *God Was Their Rock*.

This book charted not only the church's history but the history of about 50 pioneering families who were associated with the church in the early years.

Many local families have history with either the Chapel or one of its small Sunday Schools or outreach centres. If this includes your ancestors, or you are interested, come and check out some of your family history.

Carriage drivers show they're masters



Carriage driving is part of the Tasmanian Masters Games for the first time this year and a competition will be held in Native Rock Road, Railton, on Saturday, March 1, 9am-4pm. The following day, the State Show Driving

Championships will be held at the Carraige Club grounds from 9am to noon.

Carriage Driving is open to all drivers over 30 years of age from across Tasmania. It will consist of:

- classes of carriages looking for best presented;
- classes for 30-50 yrs, 50-70yrs & over 70s of different size horses and ponies;
- designated tasks for drivers which are components of dressage competitions;
- a cones course which is usually timed but in this competition will be judged on the elements that drivers need to perform well in a timed competition; and
- long reining activities

The competitors with be vying for medals and these will be presented by Kentish Mayor Kate Haberle.

The State Show Driving Championships on Sunday, March 2, is a competition for all different classes of horses and ponies as well as different types of vehicles, from period to modern.

We are also including some long reining activities in the program to encourage drivers of all stages and levels to participate.

Spectators are welcome. Entry is free.

Food will be available - a sausage sizzle, thanks to the Kentish Community Men's Shed and coffee compliments of What the Froth Coffee van.

These events are our first time at Railton and we are starting off small but hope to encourage more drivers into this equestrian sport. Many will think of carriage driving as a pastime of historical interest seeing carriages at shows or events or tourist carriage rides. Maybe harness racing or, in the past, chariot racing but carriage driving can also be a competitive equestrian sport, with many types of carriages being used.

In the late 70s, HRH Prince Phillip was a part of Federation Equestrian Internationale which developed rules and competitions for carriage driving in Dressage, Combined Driving and Marathon (cross country) for both indoor and outdoor events. These featured single horses, pairs or teams of two or more.

The sport is very popular in Europe and attracts thousands of spectators as well as top level competitors. It is on its way to becoming an Olympic sport.

We are lucky to have a very talented Australian by the name of Boyd Exell, who has just achieved a world champion title - for the 11th time!

Today clubs around Australia have lots of competitive activities such as obstathons, timed cones competitions, Concours de Elegance, navigational drives, combined driving, marathons as well as pleasure drives along bush tracks, beaches and on private properties, including National Trust land such as Entally and Clarendon

Northern Tasmania Driving Society is a small club of volunteers with members across the North.

Our drivers are of varying ages, abilities, persuasion and levels. It is an equestrian sport in which one pony or horse can be used for both riding and carriage driving, so family members from kids to grandparents can take part. Different breeds of horses are driven from little mini's to large Clydesdales.

We are planning to have a Come & Try day on April 6 at the Carriage Club grounds in Native Rock Road, Railton. Check out Northern Tasmania Carriage Drivers on Facebook.

EV grants up to \$50k


The third ChargeSmart Electric Vehicle Charging Grant Program to expand Tasmania's public electric vehicle fast charging network is now open.

Organisations can apply for a grant up to \$50,000 but must cocontribute the same amount as the approved funding.

Grant funding is for the cost of purchasing and installing or upgrading existing electric vehicle fast charging infrastructure in Tasmania for public use.

Before you apply, you will need to have an early engagement meeting with TasNetworks to discuss whether your planned charging location is suitable.

Applications close at 2pm March 24, 2025.

We currently have space in both our Cub (ages 8-10) and Scout (ages 11-14) sections as well as openings for assistant leaders.





Home school kids work at own pace

Learning is the goal, not testing, says home school parent Rebecca Tran.

She is one of a growing number of parents in Tasmania who have chosen the personal approach to educating their children, without the structure of the school system.

"Home school is not school," says Rebecca. "It's flexible and there's no typical week – that's the beauty of home school. It's not Monday to Friday, six hours a day. You don't need all that time to teach."

She, Amy Edwards and Josephine Herman are members of the Tasmanian Home Education Network and are part of a group which meets regularly at Health Park in Sheffield with their children

for play and interaction. Despite the demands of being their children's full-time carer and missing out on benefits such as school music programs and sports, they all say they want the best for their kids.

Josephine researched educational models extensively when she was pregnant with her first child but couldn't find one that was affordable and aligned with her principles.

"So I decided to do it myself," she said, adopting aspects of the Steiner and Montessori methodologies as well as the highperforming Nordic system.

"My eldest daughter is very good at self-directed learning but she's not interested in anything that doesn't involve animals," Josephine said. "I then find resources that have animals because she doesn't care about counting dots or counting strawberries but if it's animals, she wants to learn straight away.

"So home school gives me the freedom to be able to tailor my child's education towards her neuro-type and her development, going as far or as slow as she wants to go.

"All of my family is neuro-divergent and I thought I could better teach her one-on-one knowing all her quirks and differences. Being sensitive to that rather than having her fit into a system that wasn't designed for children like her."

Amy is mother to 10-year-old Gene who has always been home schooled. At the monthly Sheffield Produce Market, he helps run the stall, dealing with customers and money, while playing the drums and coming up with ideas for other stalls.

"He's thinking about running carnival games," said Amy. "The sky's the limit! Home school kids feel free to be themselves as there's not as much peer pressure.

"I wanted my kids to develop their own sense of self."

In terms of socialising, home school kids were exposed to a greater range of ages, while those in school fraternised with their own age groups. Scouts and sports, such as swimming, offered other opportunities.

Said Rebecca: "It's not so much teaching them, it's showing them how to learn. By the time they get to high school, they know how to learn. They are interested and they enjoy learning. "It's worth every sacrifice."





Time to prune stone fruit, plant winter veg

I have just had the Kentish Garden Club visit my garden. I had spent the previous two weeks cleaning it up ready for the day, and as I sit here writing, I remember that one of my jobs for today is to pick all the nectarines now that they are ripe.

That then reminds me to tell you that all your stone fruit trees need to be pruned after they have fruited, and fed, so that they can grow next season's branches. Plums, apricots, nectarines, peaches and cherries are all stone fruits.

Walking past the Forest Walk, next to a stand of Poas (native grasses), I disturbed a large number of the common brown butterfly. I estimate there were at least two dozen of them, on a Tea Tree (Leptospermum) next to the Poas.

The Poa is the host plant for their caterpillars.

The other thing I noticed is a Helena Emperor Gum Moth caterpillar on one of my birch trees. The tree is only 2m high.



Yes, that's right, those caterpillars should be on Eucalypts, so thinking I'm doing a service to it, I moved it to a gum. I soon found he wasn't happy with me. So he is now back on the birch tree. I felt a bit sad for him, because there's not many leaves on the tree. I tried to introduce to him some leaves from another birch but he didn't like them either, so he is climbing around this almost deciduous birch, chewing on whatever he can find. I'll keep an eye on him over the next week or so to see what happens.

Interestingly, once they spin their cocoon, they can stay in there for anything from three weeks to two years, depending on conditions, before they emerge.

I'm constantly amazed by nature.

If you are planning to have your own home-grown veggies over the winter month, March is the best time to start planting cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, ale, carrots, and parsnips, but you need to be quick.

Every week counts as far as the growing season is concerned. Happy Gardening.



For Thy Great Pain Have Mercy On My Little Pain

This beautifully written and thought-provoking book tells the fictionalised story of two real medieval women, Julian of Norwich and Margery Kempe.

As we swing into Autumn, Mount Roland Land Care also swings into action with lots of

tree planting and a special nature-based presentation.

On Saturday, April 5, MRLC is hosting a special event that will interest all who love the natural environment of Kentish. To be held at Wilder Tasmania, Gowrie Park, this event will feature fabulous guest presenters, live music and great food.

Also featured will be the top 10 entrants in Naturally Kentish – a creative opportunity for residents under 20 to express their love for the natural environment of Kentish, in any artistic form – music, pictures, video, sculpture etc. Those attending will be able to vote for their favourite entry, with the winner announced on the day and presented with \$500.

This event will also launch our 2025 tree planting program. This year our target is to plant 2000 native seedlings, and we have been working hard with local property owners in Kentish to organise tree planting at 10 sites through Autumn and Spring – including Railton, Wilmot, McCoy's Road, Carey's Road, Nook, Claude Road and Johnston Street, Sheffield.

Details and timing of these events will be released on April 5 and everyone will be invited to participate in the public tree planting days that have been so successful and popular in the last two years.

Typically the tree planting event kicks off at 10am on Saturdays, with tree planting for two hours followed by lunch. We hope to again see many of those who have participated in previous tree plantings, but also look forward to seeing new faces, too. It's a great communal atmosphere, everyone is welcome (though pre-registration is essential), no special skills required, just a base level of fitness.

Our tree-planting program continues to be supported by the Tasmanian Government through its Healthy Tas program.

Foxgloves now a declared weed in Tasmania



On February 19, the Tasmanian Government announced that Foxgloves have been listed as a Declared Weed in Tasmania. This comes as encouraging news for many across Kentish and beyond who have been battling this weed for years.

Foxgloves are best known as a much-loved cottage garden plant,

and they've been around in gardens for a very long time, well over 100 years in Tasmania. In recent times, something has changed, and they have become an environmental weed of great significance, invading bushland, plantation land and degraded pastures right across the state.

Foxgloves are also toxic, any contact with the skin can create problems, eating foxgloves can be fatal. As such they are a health risk for humans, but also native animals, farm animals and companion animals.

The Declaration still allows hybrid sterile foxgloves to be sold and grown in Tasmania, and it doesn't prohibit growing even weedy foxgloves in some urban areas. The management focus is on protecting our native areas – such as Mount Roland Regional Reserve and the Tasmanian World Heritage Areas.

Mount Roland Land Care has been lobbying for Foxgloves to become a Declared Weed for more than seven years, and welcomes the action taken by the Tasmanian Government. It now looks forward to allocation of Government support and resources to assist the 'war on foxgloves'.

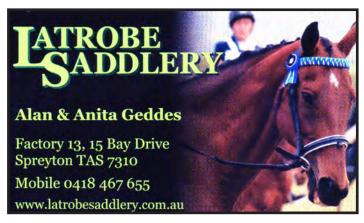

This action includes accelerating women's health equality and addressing the gender health gap. The "gender health gap" refers to the differences in health outcomes and access to healthcare that women face, as well as among women of different racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds. These gaps impact women in many ways, including differences in life expectancy, maternal mortality, access to preventive care, and the prevalence of certain diseases.

The gender health gap is also influenced by social determinants of health, such as income, education and employment.

quality healthcare. Expanding access to affordable (or free) healthcare through services, addressing geographic barriers, and investing in telehealth can make healthcare more accessible.

Women are more likely than men to experience mental health issues, such as depression, anxiety, and PTSD. Yet, stigma around mental health, combined with limited access to mental health services, often prevents women from seeking or receiving the care they need. Expanding access to mental health services, offering supportive environments for women to talk openly about mental health (such as Rural Health Tasmania), and reducing stigma can help ensure women receive appropriate care.

By focusing on these areas, we can work toward closing the women's health gap and ensuring that women have equal access to the resources and care they need to live healthy lives.



Tassie's most controversial medic,

In these monthly articles, an occasional mention has been made of Dr Victor Ratten, who had a medical practice in Sheffield between Jan 1908 and April 1916. He brought a new style of medical practice to this sleepy little country town that jolted this rural community into the 20th century.

Energetic and confident, Victor Ratten (29) arrived clean shaven, without whiskers or moustache, driving one of the first motorcars to come to the Kentish district. He established a massive practice, opened his own private hospital, became health officer for the Kentish Municipal Council, joined the local Light Horse Brigade as their doctor and was appointed a JP. People were amazed at the speed with which he could reach the sick and injured, his sociable 'persona' and his sporting prowess. When WWI broke out, Dr Ratten sailed with the first contingent of soldiers to the Middle East, where for several months he served as surgeon to wounded and dying soldiers before returning to his practice in Sheffield. In 1917 he purchased a medical practice in Hobart and the following year was chosen to be surgeon general of the Royal Hobart Hospital, where his flimsy US medical credentials were ruthlessly challenged by jealous British-educated doctors.

Dubbed "Tasmania's most controversial and flamboyant medic", Ratten's reputation surpassed all other Tasmanian doctors, with one possible exception. For a doctor who so impacted our island state, we need to look in more detail at his time in Sheffield and follow his intriguing Tasmanian story to the end. Since I last wrote Ratten's story over 20 years ago, recent researchers have unearthed several roguish and dishonest aspects of his character.

Ratten's Early Life

Born 1878 in Kew, Victoria, Victor Ratten was the oldest child of **George & Eliza Ratten**. Victor was educated in two private schools in Vic and NSW run by his father, who later became an ordained Anglican minister. As a youth, Victor won several cycling championships. After training as a dentist in Sydney in 1899, he commenced a dental practice in country NSW but in 1903 moved to Brisbane. Subsequently, he went to the USA, where, in March 1907, he fraudulently procured a diploma of medicine from Harvey Medical College, Chicago.

When Victor returned to Brisbane with his medical diploma, the ambitious and charismatic young doctor courted **Blanche Greaves**, daughter of a Brisbane Irish-Catholic publican. Convent educated, with plenty of natural vivacity, Blanche loved music, singing and theatre; her talented voice having won her a part in the musical comedy The Skirt Dancer. Victor Ratten came to Tasmania to visit his father, now rector of St Paul's Church, Stanley. Then while in Hobart, Ratten presented his recent American certificate to the Tasmanian Medical Board and was registered as a doctor on 22 May 1907. He then purchased the practice of **Dr Ed Chisholm** in Sheffield who was returning to Sydney. Back in Brisbane, Victor Ratten married Blanche Greaves in Oct 1907 and, following their honeymoon, settled in Sheffield, where in due course their two sons were born — **John** in 1909 and **William** in 1911.

Sheffield Medical Practice and Hospital

Victor & Blanche took over the house/surgery of Dr Chisholm on the corner of Main & Henry Sts, near to the present-day Chinese restaurant. Dr Ratten then rented a house off Main St (where the Visitor Centre now stands) and opened his own hospital in Sheffield. Dr Ratten hired local nurse **Flora Buck**

(36) as matron. After running Dr Ratten's hospital for four years, Matron Flora Buck discovered she was pregnant and left for Launceston to await her baby's arrival. This baby was born in Oct 1912 on Flora's 40th birthday and was registered Florence Buck. Because Florence (always known as Flossie) was never told who her father was, years later, after she had her own family of three boys and a girl, her sons were led to believe that their mother's father was Dr Victor Ratten. This was because their mother Florence's facial features strongly resembled Victor Ratten's, and they had been discouraged from having a DNA test. However, only two years ago, with her sons now in their late 70s, their only sister took it upon herself to establish the truth once and for all and submitted her DNA for testing. No Ratten connection was detected.

Meanwhile, in 1909, Dr Ratten purchased the block diagonally opposite the surgery, across Main St, and built an elaborate 11-room house facing Main St, with his adjoining surgery facing Henry St. It also had an underground cool cellar. Separate from the residence was Ratten's big entertainment room with a large fireplace and two billiard tables for special social evenings. To complete the complex, a large circular water fountain adorned the front lawn and a concrete swimming pool was built on the Henry St side of his house. When the Tasmanian branch of the British Medical Association (BMA) was formed in 1911, Dr Ratten applied for membership but was refused on account of his 'American' qualifications.

In 1911, Ratten had Sheffield builder **James Sellars** construct his own much larger private hospital in Main St next door to his house. His specially designed nine-room hospital he called *St Helen's Hospital* became operational in Oct 1912 when **Sister Jean Davidson**, ex-matron of Geelong General Hospital, took charge. Ratten loved surgery, and it was locally bragged, "There isn't a rabbit in Sheffield left with an appendix."

Not only did Dr Ratten have one of the first cars owned by Kentish residents, he changed it every two years. His second car was purposely fitted out in Melbourne to allow the rear 'dickie' seat to be lowered to a horizontal position and a stretcher to slide in and out the back of the vehicle. In Jan 1912, his third car was an imported Lorainne Deitrich from France and his fourth motor vehicle a 33hp Fiat from Italy – one of the most expensive cars imported into Australia to date. It was registered in Jan 1914, the same month Dr Ratten was fined for excessive speeding along Marine Terrace, Burnie. Before the Railton–Sheffield railway line opened, the Kentish Council hired Dr Ratten and his motor car to convey the governor and the premier up to Sheffield for their public visits.

But it was as a local sportsman that Ratten really distinguished himself. The Sheffield Cricket Club soon made him their opening batsman, and the following year, patron of the club. In 1909 when all the local football teams were reorganised into a new Wilmot Football Association, Dr Ratten was appointed president and immediately provided the perpetual Victor Ratten Shield awarded annually to the premiership team. He chaired meetings of the local tennis club, was vice president of the local fishing club and enjoyed pigeon shooting.

Ratten's passion for horse racing was shared with his good friend and fellow racehorse owner **Tom Butler** of Randwick, Sheffield. However, in mid-1911, everybody was shocked when Dr Victor Ratten made national headlines for race fixing at the Mowbray Racecourse and was given a lifetime ban from all Tasmanian racecourses. It involved his chestnut gelding Ally

Sloper, recently purchased from **Hugh Powell** of Sheffield. The horse had been bred by **Law(rence) Bray** and his jockey was **Walter Morphett**, both of Sheffield. Within a few years, Ratten's persuasive powers had his lifetime ban lifted, and he ultimately became one of the most influential members in the Tasmanian racing industry.

In Sheffield, Ratten joined the Aus Light Horse Regiment, and by 1912 he became medical officer for the whole 26th Light Horse Regiment, carrying the rank of Army Captain. Being a medical reservist, when WW1 broke out in Aug 1914, within six days Dr Ratten closed his hospital, arranged for a substitute doctor to take over his practice and reported for duty with the Aus Army Medical Corps. As he left town, the Sheffield band paraded in front of his residence playing patriotic songs.

Dr Ratten departed for Egypt aboard the troop carrier *Geelong* in Oct 1914. Assigned to a huge field hospital on the northern coastline of Egypt, he spent many hours of surgery treating injured and dying soldiers. But five months later in Mar 1915, Dr Ratten arrived back in Melbourne in charge of the hospital ship Kyarra, which was filled with wounded soldiers being invalided home. Twice at sea, the doctor had the ship stop while he undertook appendicectomies on soldiers. Once the wounded were off-loaded, Ratten boarded the *Loonganna* for a quick visit to Tasmania while waiting for army orders to return to Egypt. Somehow, however, Dr Ratten gained a discharge from the army and resumed his medical practice in Sheffield.

Then, in April 1916, Dr Ratten announced he had sold his medical practice to **Dr David Hamilton** and was moving to Hobart. He closed St Helen's Hospital and sold the bedsteads and mattresses to the Devon Hospital. His specially built hospital was sold to **Herb Tredennick**, who practised dentistry there for nearly 40 years. Ratten's high-class furniture and household goods were auctioned off by **Harry Day**. To accommodate his two billiard tables, Dr Ratten purchased Padman's Hall, opposite the Methodist church, and opened a public billiard saloon run by **Jimmy Clarke**. At the Rattens' farewell dinner held in Maddox Caledonian Hotel, **Hon E F Blyth** presented Dr & Mrs Ratten with a hall clock made of polished cedar wood engraved 'V.R.R. from his Sheffield friends 18/4/16' and a plush case containing seven smoking pipes, each engraved with a day of the week.

Hobart & Royal Hobart Hospital

In Hobart, Dr Ratten purchased the private surgical practice of **Dr J E Wolfhagen** in Davey St who ran his own private hospital. The following year, 1917, the Tasmanian Government – needing to fill the vacancy of surgeon-superintendent of the Royal Hobart Hospital – appointed Dr Ratten to that position. He became an immediate success, undertaking complex operations, such as successfully removing a piece of shell from the backbone of a returned soldier that the Launceston surgeons wouldn't touch.

But Ratten's appointment brought him into conflict with the same medical establishment in Tasmania that had denied him membership back in 1911. It brought to a head the nearly decade-long dispute between the local branch of the British Medical Association (BMA) and the Tasmanian Government

over the role of the hospital surgeon-superintendent doing free surgery in the hospital. They had lobbied hard to have the position of hospital surgeon-superintendent abolished so that they could practice surgery in the hospital and charge their wealthy clients. The government flatly refused their request, and **Premier Lee** filled the vacancy by bypassing all BMA doctors and appointing newcomer Dr Victor Ratten. This raised the ire of these BMA doctors, who had all gained their degrees from long-standing, credible universities, and they now began to question Ratten's flimsy diploma gained in what seemed like a matter of months from an unknown American college that no longer existed. Their merciless attacks forced the government into a royal commission to prove whether Ratten's American credentials were genuine.

After the longest delay in 1918, the Royal Commission received confirmation that there had been a Harvey Medical College in Chicago, Ratten had been a student there and his certificate was genuine. But later researchers found Harvey Medical College closed in 1905, prior to Ratten's arrival, and that his diploma was fraudulently acquired. But with his gregarious personality, Ratten found he could influence parliamentarians to support him when needed. They passed a law that allowed him to continue practising.

Dr Ratten served as surgeon-superintendent of the Royal Hobart Hospital from 1917 to 1936. His reputation was based largely on his exceptional surgical ability. Ratten halved the time taken to perform appendectomies, pioneered stomach surgery in Tasmania with gastrostomies and, about 1925 or 1926, performed a craniotomy. None of his critics could match his performance. Old Sheffield patients like **Mrs Wm Braid** and **Ed Best** travelled to Hobart so Ratten could do their operations. Ratten was loved by the public and government, who in 1925 awarded him a MBE and in 1932 an OBE. At the same time, he was hated by many in the medical profession until a truce was declared in 1932.

When Ratten's long association with the Royal Hobart Hospital concluded in June 1936, he resumed private surgery in his old private hospital in Davey St until his death in 1962. He became a very wealthy man. He owned his own hospital, several business premises, mining shares and a stable of racehorses, which won the Hobart and Launceston cups several times. He bought an exclusive island down the Derwent estuary, which he accessed via his own motor launch.

Because of his philandering ways, in midlife Victor and Blanche separated, but the popular Dr Ratten, with his 1952 Rolls Royce and fast river launch, had no shortage of lady friends. Dr Ratten dominated the racing fraternity in the south. He was chairman of the Hobart Turf Club and committee member of the Tasmanian Racing Club from 1947–1961. Even when he became ill, he still attended these meetings in his dressing gown, constantly smoking cigars.

Dr Ratten died in Hobart on 30 Dec 1962, aged 84. As a mark of respect, the doctor's cortege passed by the Royal Hobart Hospital on its way to the Cornelian Bay Cemetery, where he was cremated.

His elder son, Wing Commander **John Richard Ratten** (1908-1945) of the RAAF, won the Distinguished Flying Cross and died on active service in World War II. Today, a mural of Dr Ratten operating on a kitchen table by the lights of his motor car is depicted on the side of a building he once owned in Henry St, Sheffield.









"Most groups are run by volunteers on very small budgets," she said. "It is very rewarding to see and hear what our grants allow community groups to achieve

"In 2024, we provided \$28,000 in grants to six deserving organisations.

"Our grant program is one way we can give back to the Tasmanian community."
