## **EDITORIAL**

Voting is a privilege, a precious right. A right many in the world are fighting to achieve while we in Australia sometimes take our privileges for granted, sometimes resent having our Saturdays interrupted by attending a polling booth, despite the attraction of Democracy sausages.

Some dodge the electoral roll altogether, for reasons personal, political and even persecutional.

Despite having a voting system and a democracy which shines on the world stage, some voting-age citizens abrogate their right to decide who runs the country. And then usually whinge about how we're being governed.

At the 2024 Tasmanian election, 6.3 per cent of voters cast informal votes, meaning they either deliberately or accidentally didn't comply with the rules, and weren't counted towards the election result.

So make sure to read the instructions carefully for both the Senate and the House of Representatives. Ballot papers can be wide and unwieldy and sometimes it's difficult to number all those squares. Take your time, it's worth the effort.

This federal election, about half of eligible voters were expected to lodge their decision at pre-polling booths before May 3, a luxury not enjoyed by all in the voting world.

It is up to all of us to work out which party, which candidate, will best represent our interests in Canberra. Many online tools are available to help guide your decision. Some websites give you the option of keying in the issues that are important to you to see how they align with the candidates/parties.

All elections are important, but this one especially so with uncertainty in global economies and the ongoing wars in many quarters of the world.

Australia is far from immune from this international conundrum so it's important to think about the wider implications of your vote. Enjoy your privilege.

# Pharmacy staff get chatty with clients

Sometimes a visit to the pharmacy or supermarket is a person's only social interaction for the day.

Staff at Turnbulls Pharmacy in Sheffield recognised this unmet social need and have responded with the launch of the Chatty Café, a weekly get-together over coffee and nibbles starting **Friday, May 9**, from 2-3pm.

The Chatty Café Scheme is a global movement dedicated to preventing and reducing loneliness and social isolation.

It aims to spark conversations that go beyond the ordinary, fostering social connections within the community.

Pharmacist Robyn Yaxley heard about the concept when doing a course on loneliness and decided to create a space within Turnbulls Pharmacy where people feel welcome.

"One in five people are lonely," said Robyn. "It's a worldwide phenomenon."

Pharmacy Assistant Maree Brown, who organised funding through The Hub for the café, said staff often chat with customers about more than medicines, fulfilling a social need, but were limited by time.

"People just want to talk," she said.

Maree describes the pharmacy as "the hub of the town" with up to 200 scripts being filled in a day, meaning a lot of people coming in and out.



"Hopefully they will stay a little longer and make new friends," she said.

"Chatting is essential for mental and physical well-being." Chatty Café welcomes all ages and stages.

"We aim to create an environment where people feel encouraged to chat and connect," Maree said.

This project is using remote sensor cameras to record – sometimes for the first time – the plants and animals of Mount Roland. With the project now in its second year, it's fascinating to see the emergence of a longitudinal picture of 'Life on the Mountain'.

Indoor performances were brought to a climax by presentations to the winners of the Naturally Kentish youth award. Those attending each had one vote to determine the winner and two runners up. All agreed the choice was very difficult, each of the 10 finalists were of a very high standard.

But at the end of the voting there was a clear winner - Minnow

Flora (*left*) with her 'Masked Owl Mask' – a delightfully sculptured piece crafted from natural collected materials.

There were two runners up, 8-year-old Quilla Rose (*right*) who performed her composition 'All I want to See', and Minnow also was a 'runner up' with her second entry, a painting titled 'Wild Kentish'.

Overall, an evening to remember. Many thanks to the volunteers at Mount



# Get the garden ready for winter rains

### Gardening with Robert Gower

There are a few things I like to do now we are into May.

The first is to deadhead the roses, as most have just finished flowering. I will just remove the spend heads and tidy the bushes a little. The pruning will be done late July-early August.

The second thing is to get into some of the garden beds where weeds, like twitch and clover, have made themselves at home over summer. Using my garden fork, I dig down and loosen the soil, and remove all the runners from under the ground and clean up the beds ready to be mulched.

Once the rains come we will have a lot of weed seeds germinating, so best to get on top of those beds now.

One of the other jobs I generally do at this time of year is mow the grass down low. I have a large deciduous garden bed that I allow the grass to grow on during the year. I have 1000 daffodils planted in this bed, and this is their third year.

While the ground has still got some warmth in the soil, it's a good time to start planting any plants, so long as they are not frost tender. I normally do a lot of revegetation work around my property now. The plants will establish a reasonable root system and this will help them survive over the drier months when we get into mid spring.

You might still have to water those plants that are a bit water sensitive, but it will help them a great deal to get them in now. I also like to prune the foliage off all my Hellebores, so when they flower over winter you will have lots of color. Happy Gardening!

# Medicare to open mental

A 'home' has been confirmed for Devonport's new Medicare Mental Health Centre, which will increase access to free mental health support for people living in the area.

# Hydro continues Cethana conversation

Hydro Tasmania loves hearing what local people and businesses think about the planned pumped hydro project at Cethana. We've already had great conversations - hearing everything from concerns and issues to exciting ideas and opportunities!

Recently, Gina met with the Mersey Forth Recreational Management Group, which included members from local ski clubs, rowing and canoe groups, and the Kentish Council. The group visited the Cethana site to learn more about the project.

"It's wonderful to have such interest in the project," Gina said.

Gina said the group had lots of good questions about how the project might affect the area around Lake Barrington, the size of the project, how long it will take to build, and how people can access Lake Cethana.

They even got to look at rock samples taken from deep underground at the site, which showed good conditions for building the proposed tunnels and power station.

With keen interest from the group, we will continue the conversation. "We are planning a workshop to talk more about impacts and opportunities," Gina said.

The next stage for Cethana will be the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). Getting together with the community always give us such valuable feedback, which is important as we start to understand the finer details of the project.

Our recent marketing initiatives were a great success, helping generate strong interest and visibility for local properties. Buyers are out and about, and well-presented rural homes are being noticed.



An important part of the reason to expand our kerbside waste services to include FOGO was to divert materials from landfill and in the process reduce the environmental impact this has and save state waste levy. The table below shows how we are going in each community to achieving our Cradle Coast regional goal of 60% of municipal waste being recovered and reused by 2028.

We are also well on our way as a community to reaching State and National resource recovery targets of:

- 50% recovery across all waste streams by 2025 and 80% by 2030.
- . Halve the amount of organic waste sent to landfill by 2030.

Ruth is now thriving in school, Vincent can run and play like any other child, and Eveline has regained her ability to provide for the family.


"The miraculous vision has brought us more than just clear sight - it has brought us hope, joy and a brighter future," said Boniface.

Autumn is harvest time – those apples just keep coming and they are getting sweeter as the

weather cools. Not so palatable are the odd shaped apples that you may have noticed on camellias and wondered about.

These small green 'apples' are the fruit of the camellia – indeed, although the fruit looks like an apple, camellias are not related to apples. The apple-like fruit won't be seen on every camellia but are abundant on some varieties including the white-flowered Camellia japonica 'Lovelight' and many sasanquas.

As the fruit matures it splits open to reveal several hard seeds. These can be sown



in seed raising mix or a small pot with potting mix and will germinate and produce seedling camellias. The young plants will take several years to flower and may not be the same as the parent plant, but it is a fun and cheap way to increase your camellia collection.

# How to outfox this noxious weed



Foxgloves (*Digitalis purpurea*), a pretty spiked flower and a perennial favourite to some,

is unfortunately a serious pest in Tasmania, particularly in Kentish. It has now been declared both an environmental and agricultural weed.

All parts of the plant are extremely toxic to humans and animals and can be absorbed through the skin.

What can I do on my property to help prevent the spread?

Unfortunately, we live in an area that is the perfect environment for Foxgloves. They love light, bare soil, rain, sun and slightly acidic soils – basically they love lack of competition.

If you have Foxgloves on your property, you need a plan and May is the perfect time to start hand pulling (using gloves) the seedlings from around your waterways and pastures, before the flowers develop in Spring and spread millions of viable seed.

Make sure you remove the whole root and disturb the soil as little as possible. You can use your favourite gardening tool to gently pry out the roots and then shake the soil off.

When you hand-pull, be sure that you are pulling the whole plant out. If you just pull the top off, it will regrow worse than ever. Foxgloves tend to break off at ground level when you pull them: you need to get your fingers further down under the little knob you can feel and pull from there.

Remember to back plant with grass or other species after weeding to minimise competition!

For larger and highly affected areas and away from waterways, the best method is selective spraying when the Foxglove is in a growth phase, this is usually in early Spring and Autumn.

Cut and paste works well on mature foxgloves. Cut the flower

spike off, then immediately apply a dab of herbicide (glyphosate is good for this). In a perfect world, you wouldn't let your foxgloves get big enough to be worth cutting and pasting, but in real life it happens.

# Producers target Japanese market

On April 9, members of The Australian Food and Wine Collaboration Group – including Dairy Australia, Hort Innovation, Wine Australia, Meat & Livestock Australia and Seafood Industry Australia – held a series of trade development workshops in Tokyo.

It's the sixth target market for the Collaboration Group, which has previously focused its attention on emerging markets across Asia, including Thailand, South Korea, Vietnam, Indonesia and Taiwan. Over the past two years, it has met with more than 1000 food, trade and government representatives – leveraging the individual sectors' export strengths to deepen industry and government networks, advance bilateral trade and improve market access for the Australian Government.

Dairy Australia Managing Director Dr David Nation said Australia is ranked fourth in the share of Japan imports for dairy by volume, and in 2023-24 Australia exported 59,000 tonnes of dairy product, worth US\$306 million.



National Palliative Care Week is an opportunity to have an awkward conversation with your loved ones, share your feelings and chat about what is important to you when planning for your future care.





## **COMMENT - GOOD GOVERNANCE**

'YouGov' did a survey asking a number of people about the forthcoming federal election. One of the most startling results was that 51% of respondents had no idea there was one!

Last November, 'Voice' published my 'Comment' regarding the term 'politics'. This time, I want to discuss what we mean by 'Governance' and how the Federal Government governs.

Governance is about putting into practice the policies outlined by the political party elected to office. The political party (not the voters) elects the prime minister, and he or she chooses a few members to form the cabinet and other portfolios of office in government. Most notable are the Prime Minister, Treasurer, the Foreign Minister, Attorney General, and other ministers.

Governance, in short, refers to the processes, structures, and practices through which decisions are made and enforced within Government, encompassing leadership, accountability, transparency, and compliance.

What is good governance? In a nutshell, it means there is fairness, the rule of law is abided by, and sensitive to the needs of stakeholders, ensuring that decisions are relevant and producing desired outcomes while making the best use of resources.

We trust our government to do the right thing, even if we may not always agree with what is being proposed.

Unfortunately, trust in governance globally is falling, including here in Australia. Voters complain, as do some federal politicians, that those in power are not governing in the

common interest, but rather in the interest of themselves and the groups that fund and support them.

This is what was said in the 'Australian Journal of Public Administration' in July 2024. "The politicization of the public service and the rise of careerist politicians have led to the separation of what was once two distinct careers within the political elite. This has changed the decision premise of the advisory system for policy and implementation, leading to worse public policy, even policy disasters."

The 'Robo Debt' saga is a prime example.

How can we get a fairer representation in parliament if the voting public does nothing to stem the increasing lack of transparency and accountability? Perhaps more involvement in current affairs as much of our lives are governed by what takes place in parliament.

From the regulation of how much excise is taken from the petrol pump to the number of immigrants allowed into the country, how we aim to get to net-zero emissions by 2050, and the amount of tax not taken from big corporations.

For those who say it is a waste of time voting for Minor Parties and the Independents, that they will never make for governing the county, let us not forget that things do change. Both the major parties' membership is at a record low, and so too is the percentage of first preferences at elections.

Your vote counts. Unless we all make the effort to ensure our local member is held accountable, then nothing will change.

'Good Governance' is in the interest of everyone.

# Huge crowds celebrate the return

#### Staverton

Sept 1915: The Sheffield railway station was packed on Saturday evening by a crowd that raised an enthusiastic welcome as the steam train from Railton arrived bearing Private Lionel Weeks of Staverton. He was the first wounded soldier to be returned to Kentish to recuperate.

Lionel had been a member of the Staverton Light Horse and one of the first men in Kentish to enlist. He had been in the trenches at Gallipoli for only two months when he was hit with a Turkish bullet in his hip while boiling the billy. The bullet is now a valuable trophy of his, along with pieces of his rifle that, on another occasion, was shot out of his hands while aiming at the enemy.

At Sheffield station, Ed Harrison provided his motor car for the wounded soldier to sit in while Warden GA Morse made a welcome speech and refreshments were served. The train then steamed on to Roland, where his Staverton family and friends were waiting to greet him. After two months' recuperation, Private Lionel Weeks returned to the war front in Nov 1915, where he was again wounded before finally being discharged in Mar 1919.

### Wilmot

*Nov 1916:* An enthusiastic welcome home social was given to Captain Martyn Clerke, who has returned from Egypt to recuperate from injuries. The Wilmot Rechabite Hall was gaily decorated with bunting and greenery. After the national anthem, a powerful speech by the Hon John Hope MLC welcomed Captain Clerke home.

Captain Clerke was one of the first in the state to enlist and spent five months at Gallipoli, from where he was invalided to England suffering from enteric fever. Three months later, he rejoined his regiment in the Sinai Peninsula and was promoted to captain. During the Battle of Romani in Aug 1916, when the Allied Forces, led by General Allenby, stopped the Turks' second attempt to capture the Suez Canal, Martyn was hit by a machine gun bullet in his left knee, which necessitated his being sent home to Tasmania to recuperate.

Hon Hope said he had two sons at the front, one of whom had served under Captain Clerke. During this same Battle of Romani, his son had his horse shot under him, and it was 'a Wilmot horse, and a good one'. After recovering, Martyn Clerke returned to France where he was promoted to Major in May 1918 and awarded the DSO (Distinguished Service Order).

### West Kentish

May 1918: A good number of residents met at the West Kentish railway siding on Tuesday evening to welcome home Driver Frank Harvey, who has returned from the front wounded, gassed and ill. Frank (22) looked considerably older after his three and a half years of war service.

James & Martha Harvey's three boys are all in khaki. Frank and Percy enlisted three and a half years ago and the youngest, Ted, about two and a half years ago. Without his sons, their father, James Harvey, has been handicapped in his work on the farm, and it is thought by many that there should be no necessity for Driver Harvey, who has six months' leave of absence, to return to the frontlines.

### **Barrington**

Feb 1919: Sergeant Jack Mason of Barrington arrived in

Sheffield by the 11.15am steam train yesterday. There were many persons at the station who welcomed him with cheers. The band led the procession from the railway station to the Caledonian Hotel, playing suitable selections. In the absence of the warden, Mr MA Bruce (Manager, Commercial Bank) extended a cordial welcome home to the returned soldier.

Sergeant Mason went away with the 40th Battalion and came back with three stripes added to his rank. He has been wounded twice and is still on crutches because of a bullet through his thigh. On arrival, Jack was besieged by a very large number of friends, who were undoubtedly glad to see him home.

### Lower Barrington/Sheffield

Dec 1918: A very enjoyable evening was spent in the Victoria Hall on Tuesday to welcome Private Edmund Rockliff, who was recently invalided home. Mr. Ellwood presented him with a gold medal, which was fastened to his coat by his mother. Private Rockliff suitably responded. A nice supper was handed round and the national anthem sung, after which the young people indulged in various games until a late hour.

All seven sons of Sam & Eliza Goss of Lower Barrington enlisted for the war front, and apart from Hector Goss (28), rejected on medical grounds, the other six sons fought in long conflicts. In 1915 their sons at the front were Frank Goss (32), Henry Goss (27), Arthur Goss (25), Lambert Goss (24), George Goss (22) and Alfred Goss (20). Although all survived the war, most returned home with serious wounds.

First to arrive home injured in May 1917 was Lambert Goss, but after a few months recuperating, he returned to France. In Sept 1917, Lance-Corporal Frank Goss was invalided home, arriving unexpectedly at Sheffield by the midday train, suffering gunshot wounds to his left lung and back. A few weeks later, Frank was the only son home with his mother when she died in Oct 1917.

In Jan 1919, Henry Goss arrived home from an English hospital having been severely gassed twice. Alfred and Arthur Goss arrived in Sep 1919, both having been wounded, with Arthur having spent two and a half years in hospital. George Goss was also wounded in France and hospitalised in England. There he met his future wife in Dorchester, married her Easter 1919 and chose to remain in England.

After the war, Henry and Arthur Goss shared a soldier settlement farm together in Barrington, and both married young daughters of Walter Crack of Kentish. Henry (32) m Hazel Crack (16) in 1919 and had 15 children. Arthur (31) m her sister Minnie Crack (16) in 1921 and had 17 children. Eventually, both Henry's and Arthur's large families came to live at the eastern end of Main St, Sheffield. Arthur Goss became a war invalid in early life and left Minnie a widow at age 54; her youngest son went blind at age 6 and her physically handicapped second youngest, spent years in St Giles Hospital Henry & Hazel Goss's tenth child became a veterinary doctor, and in Feb 2013, aged 76, he wrote: 'I, Dr. Patrick James Goss, sit and ponder in full humility the man I admired in his time above all others - my father, Henry Herbert Goss, born Nov 1888 to Samuel & Elizabeth Goss. Sadly, and to my horror, this man - my father, my friend, my mentor and a shoulder to cry upon – departed this earth in July 1956 from a massive heart attack and was put to his well-earned rest in the Sheffield Cemetery. May his GOD and my GOD forever cradle him in HIS arms till we meet again. Amen. Oh my loving father, I am

following you soon as I am riddled with cancer. Amen to that too.'

### Sheffield

June 1919: Five more Kentish lads returned to Sheffield on Monday's evening train. They were Sergeant-Major H McNab, Bombardier Tom Robson, Privates Bray, Charles and Roy Glover. A large crowd met them at the station. The Sheffield Brass band playing patriotic airs, marched ahead of them up the Main St where Mr MA Bruce, on behalf of the warden, extended to the men a very hearty welcome home. Commenting on the return of brothers Charles & Roy Glover, Mr Bruce was pleased to say all four of Mr Tom Glover's sons had enlisted and were now all home.

Oct 1919: A social in honour of a dozen men returning from France will be held on Thursday next. Their names: Corporal Torch (& wife), Air Mechanic Singleton, Privates Nunn, Padman, Moles, Bray (& wife), Listner, Milne, Rouse, Wm Hope, J Morris and B Thompson (& wife).

### Claude Road

Sept 1917: On Saturday night, a welcome home social was held at Claude Road in honour of the return of Private David Steers. Private Steers left Tasmania in July 1916 and was wounded by a shell splinter during the battle for the Somme in France. He was sent home as his left arm is, at present, practically useless. A warm welcome was extended to the returned soldier.

July 1919: A welcome home social was held at the Claude Road school for Sergeant-Major Fitzmaurice & his wife. He returned after four years serving abroad. His parents have recently taken over the local PO/store. After an entertaining programme, the chairman (Cr Chas Lord) presented the returned soldier with a handsome gold medal, to which S-M Fitzmaurice expressed his appreciation of the honour accorded to his wife and himself.

Aug 1919: A welcome home social was held in the schoolroom on Friday night for three returned soldiers, Sergeant Ern Billing (MM) and Privates Fred Febey and John McCoy. The building was packed to overflowing. As the soldiers were escorted to the platform, they were cheered to the tune 'Home Sweet Home', and the national anthem was then played by the Sheffield Brass Band. Cr Chas Lord presided and extended a hearty welcome to the returned heroes and spoke in eulogistic terms for the work they had done for king and country. The chairman, on behalf of the residents, presented each soldier with a gold medal, suitably inscribed. Misses L Whiley, G Billing and G Febey pinned the medals on the breasts of the soldiers. Sergeant Billing returned thanks for himself and his mates.

Oct 1919: On Tuesday night, another welcome home was held. Three more returned soldiers were on the platform: Privates Whiley, Elliott and Febey. Councillor Lord presided. He voiced the genuine pleasure of all present at being able to again welcome home men who had done so well in the field. A short program filled in a pleasant hour, and then each returned soldier was presented with a suitably inscribed gold medal. Private Whiley expressed the thanks of the men for the welcome given them. Private Febey's English bride was also welcomed to the district and presented with a gold brooch. The singing of the national anthem closed the programme, and supper was served.

### Railton

Dec 1918: By the Tuesday evening train, Private Chas &

Corporal Wm Densley MM returned to Railton from war service in France, where Wm and two mates took out the last gun at Anzac Cove. Long before the train arrived, the station was thronged with people. As the two soldiers alighted from the train, the Drum & Fife Band played 'Rule, Britannia' and 'Home Sweet Home' amidst intense cheering. One of the returning lads remarked, 'I didn't think there were so many people in Railton!' Later that evening, the welcome social included two other brave lads: Lance-Corporal Jim Mawer and Private J Lockett, recently invalided home.

The gathering in the hall was a large one, and a most enjoyable time was had. Mr EF Blyth MHA presided and gave a powerful address on the bravery of our men. Dr Parker, president of the local branch of the RSL, welcomed the returned men. After a full program of vocal and instrumental items, the chairman, in presenting the handsome gold medals to the returned men, referred to the distinctions they won, particularly Corporal W Densley's, who had not only gained the coveted distinction of the Military Medal but had also won 'a bar' for the medal.

Oct 1919: On Wednesday evening, Carroll's Hall, Railton, was literally packed to the doors for the welcoming home of the last of the Railton soldiers. The returned men honoured were Captain Aubrey White, Corporals George Anderson, V Goss and Andrew Anderson, and Privates Walter Lawler, Arthur Lamont and Albert Roughley. Also, Captain White's French wife and Corporal G Anderson's Scottish wife & baby daughter. On behalf of the residents, each man was presented with a handsome gold medal, and to both Mrs White & Mrs Anderson, a gold brooch.

### Beulah

July 1918: A welcome home was given in the local hall to returned soldiers Privates Cliff Sharman, Ray O'Garey, Alex Campbell and Edward Hooper. The Warden Cr Blyth MHA presented each with a handsome gold medal. Private Campbell was given a fountain pen on behalf of the staff and scholars of Beulah Baptist Sunday School. Private Sharman's medal was pinned on by his mother, Private Campbell's by his sister Mrs F Sharman, Private O'Garey's by Miss Kitty Doyle and Private Hooper's by Miss Sylvia Dawkins.

*Sept 1918:* The Beulah Hall was crowded to its utmost capacity (many being unable to gain admission) on Wednesday evening for the welcome home of Private J McCarthy MM.


After singing the national anthem, Cr T Doyle welcomed everybody, and the lengthy programme of musical items and recitations began. He then said it gave him great pleasure to welcome home Private McCarthy after three years' absence on active service and called upon his sister, Miss J McCarthy, to pin a gold medal upon her brother's tunic. The fact that he had won a Military Medal made the district very proud, and they wished him a speedy recovery from his wounds.

Oct 1918: Fifty Babies Born on Unique Voyage

A world record was recently established by a passenger ship enroute from England to Australia. There were several hundred returning soldiers aboard with a large contingent of their English wives who were coming out to establish new homes in the colonies. During the voyage, no fewer than 50 babies were born aboard the ship. The old soldiers were delighted to welcome the new troops aboard.

(NB: After WWII, a quarter of a million American servicemen took 15,000 Australian war brides back to the USA.)

## POLICE REPORT

Tasmania Police has concluded its Easter road safety blitz, Operation Safe Arrival.

Assistant Commissioner Adrian Bodnar thanked the community for its cooperation.

"It was a busy time on Tasmanian roads and our officers were out there, working hard to keep people safe," he said.

"Sadly, during the Easter period we had three deaths on our roads.

"So far this year we have had 19 deaths from crashes, compared to eight at this time last year."

"It's devastating, and we need all motorists to realise the reality of taking risks on our roads."

Assistant Commissioner Bodnar said Operation Safe Arrival might be over, but police would continue to enforce the road rules to keep people safe.

"Keeping Tasmania's roads safe is a mission for the whole community, not just police."

"By working together, obeying road rules, and reporting dangerous driving, we can prevent crashes and save lives." *Key enforcement results* 

Drink and drug driving: Tasmania Police conducted 7596 random alcohol tests and 135 drug tests, resulting in 27 drink driving offences and 47 positive drug tests.

Speeding: 591 people were caught speeding.

Mobile phone use: Officers issued 21 fines for illegal mobile phone use while driving.

Seatbelts: 12 offences were detected for failing to wear a seatbelt correctly.
