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EDITORIAL

What a fabulous turn-out for the first Community Expo in Kentish. Volunteers with groups, clubs and associations were able to mingle and swap stories while members of the public were given a true picture of what makes this area tick.

What would life be like without our volunteers?

For a start, there would be no Christmas Parade. The annual event which sees hundreds line the streets as the participants - probably all represented at the Expo - march for their organisations, demonstrating pride and fun.

Organised by Kentish Lions, a club in desperate need of new, younger members, the Parade brings immense joy. How will it continue if the Lions are no longer able?

Without volunteers, there would be no markets. Claude Road, Railton, Lower Barrington, Wilmot and Roland markets would cease to operate, denying the community the chance to appreciate hand-made treasures and treats in a social setting. These artisans would also be without a job. Without purpose and without a regular get-together, these knitters and candle

Where would we be without the Men's Shed? An absolutely vital resource not just for the mental health benefits of members but the traditional skills they possess. News reports cite the decline in craftmanship, leading to the decay of heritage

buildings as no-one knows how to fix them properly. What a lucrative career this could be for someone willing to learn.

Without U3A, where over-50s can potentially participate in some sort of activity from kayaking to mahjong six days a week, our seniors would be less active. And therefore less involved in the community, contributing less of their time to causes.

And what about The Hub? All staff are volunteers and all money goes back into the community. Kids wouldn't have funding to travel interstate for sport; schools would miss out ... most events which rely on this money would have to scale back.

Kentish Scouts has been under threat of folding for more than a year but the committed volunteers carry on. What are they having to give up to continue? Time with family, ageing parents? Having been a Girl Guide, I understand the value of this organisation to a young person's development. Importantly, it fosters the ideal of giving back.

Twenty-three groups were represented at the Expo and practically all of them need fresh blood. Kentish SES, the firies, Railton RSL ... all in need of a new generation to take on more responsibility; time to pass the Baton and share the knowledge.

With everyone working hard to just get by these days, it's difficult to imagine where these volunteers will come from. Redwater Creek had a very successful work-for-the-dole program that ended due to Covid. Time to get such programs running again, for everyone.

Robert chooses to be happy and kind

Horticulturalist Robert Gower has a very personal reason for raising funds for the Polished Man charity, which supports women and children who need emergency housing.

When Robert was five, he and his eight-year-old sister were abducted on the way to the shops in the Melbourne suburb of West Heidelberg.

The man told them their parents were looking for them and they dutifully got into his car.

Robert was told to wait outside as the man took his sister into a wooden shed. For what seemed like hours, he listened to her scream. Time that changed both their lives forever.

He doesn't know if she was raped as it was never discussed. Police were called and his sister pointed out the car that looked like the offender's but that's as far as it went.

He doesn't even know if she went to the hospital or doctor.

His sister, not surprisingly, had a difficult childhood and teenage years, hasn't been able to form relationships, has never married or had children. She still lives in Victoria where she has found a home with a religious organisation.


Robert keeps in touch with her about once a month.

"It still makes me cry when I think about it today," he says. "I can't watch any violent movies, especially with women and children screaming like they are in pain.

"The pain is always there in the back of my mind like a shadow. The pain is who I am. I don't want my pain to go away. It is a reminder to me to be nice and kind and to be happy."

This month the Polished Man campaign encourages everyone to take a stand and commit to helping end violence against women and children by painting one nail blue during October.

Robert recently raised funds for the charity at the Claude Road



market where he collected \$572 towards safe houses. "By being happy and kind to people, the offender becomes insignificant."

When Gerald Davies started selling real estate in 2006, the average price of a house in Kentish was \$50,000 - \$150,000. Today the average is \$450,000 and demand regularly outstrips supply.

"I just love the Kentish area," he says. "It's close to Devonport and Cradle Mountain and Mt Roland is something special ... the murals are a great asset."

While living and working in the same district can sometimes be challenging, Gerald has made lifelong friends through real estate and still enjoys helping people with one of the biggest financial decisions of their lives.

"I've sold one house in High Street three times!"

Uncle to the head of Davies Construction, Luke Davies, Gerald has worked with his nephew a few times, most recently negotiating the sale of High Street land where 17 units now sit.

A Life Member of the Sheffield Cricket Club, Gerald was involved as a player in his early years to later becoming a committee member. His involvement with the club has continued over 40 years.

Gerald and his wife Bronwyn run a miniature goat stud in Roland, a horse or two and some sheep.

Growing up on the land has given Gerald the knowledge to help clients with rural issues.

"You've got to know about pumps, tanks, water licences and fertilisers, sod seeding, soils and livestock welfare ... there's a lot to know," he said. Gerald is also an Auctioneer.

While the majority of house sales are to interstate buyers, Gerald says there's movement within town, with people downsizing. "People generally don't tend to move away."

Rounding up business

It has been particularly gratifying to note that many students with identified vision issues have attended consultations with local optometrists. Christine marks 25 years of laughter

The number of long-term staff at Tandara Lodge says a lot about the place, according to carer Christine Riley who recently marked 25 years at the Sheffield nursing home.

"It's a nice little home," she said. "We have a lot of laughter in this place."

Christine credits the family connections within the 46-bed facility ("we have mothers and daughters, sisters, and husbands and wives working here"), the sense of community with many residents from Kentish, the non-profit nature of the operation and the fact it is well run.

"When the chips are down, everybody surrounds you, you're surrounded with support and caring," she said. "That's special." Christine said her job was physically demanding and emotionally challenging.

"It's a physical job, hard on your body and also emotionally hard," she said. "We treat each resident as an individual and we become very fond of them."

However such closeness has consequences. "We build a relationship with someone and then they're gone. We're constantly saying goodbye to someone we got close to.

"More than once we've all sat in that staff room and bawled our eyes out. Or you're at a funeral and you feel like you lost your Nan - again - because you already lost a Nan last month."

Christine has seen many changes over the years, with four renovations and the loss of the treasured Ladies Auxiliary, but the most significant is the way death is handled.

"I can remember when I first started, if somebody died, the doors would be all closed and they'd be shot out the back door," she said. "Now when they go, we form a guard of honour. We put on their favourite song and the staff and residents line the corridor and have a bit of a send-off and a bit of a cry.

"The residents get to say goodbye to their friend and the staff get to say goodbye as well."

Christine still enjoys being around the "oldies". "I like hearing their stories and you're making their day, too," she said. "There's always something to talk about."

Unfair dismissal laws shield employees

Given the rise in small business failures and the trend of downsizing, it's crucial for workers in Tasmania to be aware of their rights.

The laws on unfair dismissal in Tasmania aim to shield employees from being let go without a legitimate reason.

These regulations are enforced through both state and federal laws, with the Fair Work Act 2009 playing a central role. The Fair Work Commission (FWC), Australia's national workplace tribunal, handles most unfair dismissal claims in Tasmania, as the state falls under the federal industrial relations system.

According to the Fair Work Act, Tasmanian employees can lodge an unfair dismissal claim if they feel their termination was severe, unjustified, or unreasonable. This is applicable to those who have been employed for a minimum of six months (or 12 months for small businesses with less than 15 employees) and fall under the national system.

A dismissal is deemed "unfair" if it lacks a legitimate reason connected to the employee's performance, behaviour, or the operational needs of the business.

The FWC evaluates various aspects to decide if a dismissal was unfair, such as if the employee was informed of the dismissal reasons, allowed to present their side, and if the employer adhered to a fair dismissal procedure. Small businesses in Tasmania are required to comply with the Small Business Fair Dismissal Code, which outlines fair dismissal practices.

Employees who believe they were unfairly dismissed must submit a claim to the FWC within 21 days following their dismissal. Depending on the situation, remedies for unfair dismissal may include job reinstatement or compensation.

These regulations strive to ensure a fair balance between protecting employee rights and allowing employers to effectively manage their teams. Employees uncertain about their rights or the claiming process are encouraged to seek legal counsel or reach out to the Fair Work Ombudsman for guidance.


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Mayor's message: Principal leaves legacy

NWRRR BIN CHECKS

Starting in September 2024, North West Resource, Recovery and Recycling (NWRRR) will conduct bin checks and assessments to help achieve a target of less than 10% contamination in recycling bins by 2028. The bin checks will happen across the three kerbside bins - FOGO, recycling and landfill - in Kentish.

Maintaining low contamination rates is a communitywide effort, beginning with correct waste sorting in your kerbside bins. To ensure all the community stays on track, NWRRR will be running two main activities:

- Bin checks: Commencing September 2024, an informal bin check system will involve tagging bins to highlight if the household is progressing well or how they can improve.
- Bin Assessments: Commencing October 2024, a formal four strike assessment system, including the application of a sticker onto contaminated FOGO and recycling bins.

DRAFT STOCK UNDERPASS POLICY

Council is seeking feedback until the end of September 2024 on a draft Stock Underpass Policy before being formally considered by Council.

The purpose of the policy is to financially assist farmers with the installation of stock underpasses to improve the safety of the road network and allow for the uncontrolled movement of stock across the road carriageway safely, without affecting other road

The draft Policy aims to provide clear direction to the farming community on the processes and arrangements for approval and construction of stock underpasses beneath Council's Public Road network, in keeping with the following principles:

- To provide farmers with alternative options to reduce the burden of managing stock crossings over public roads.
- To value the contribution underpasses can make to the safety of the community; and

 To promote and encourage removal of the need for stock to cross road surfaces.

Eleven-year-old Emerald Rigby (*above*) from Port Sorell was one of only 18 riders out of 47 to complete the Shahzada 400km marathon endurance ride at St Albans in NSW in August.

She was one of only two riders from Tasmania, alongside her mother Lydia who teaches at Sheffield Primary School, and the youngest rider for 2024.

The five-day challenge is billed as the ultimate test of endurance and involves riding up and down the mountains surrounding the picturesque Macdonald Valley, sometimes three times in the one day. This year marked the 40th anniversary of the event.

Emerald on Z'lights Giselle completed the ride in 44:13 with the lowest heart rate and was awarded the Kohnke's Own voucher of \$100. She finished first Junior and mum Lydia on Jake finished fifth lightweight.

Emerald's grandmother Sally Brown (Hayes) said Shahzada was the toughest event for horse and rider in Australia over five days.

"Z'lights Giselle fell and Emerald hurt her ankle but strapped up and kept going, telling her mum she didn't want the float.

"From all the encouragement and followers, Emerald continued on to the finish with grit and determination."

Sally said three generations of her family had now conquered Shahzada. "My daughter has planned to do this event since Covid and my sister Dorothy Hughes was the first Tasmanian to finish the Shahzada."

Without support crew and strappers, "my daughter would have never been able to make this dream become true".

A massive thank you goes out to Heather and Greg Johnson, Bruce Brown, and Dorothy Hughes along with horses and the hardworking Shahzada committee and St Albans Community.

Lydia and Emerald received a Shahzada belt buckle and mug for finishing. Both won the team event, along with Claire Godwin riding Maringo USA and Allison Knihinicki riding Newbury Magneticaa. The prize for the teams was a rug and trophy.





Book Review


Between: A guide for parents of eight to thirteen-yearolds by Sarah Ockwell-Smith

As well as bringing local gardeners together once a month for a meeting with a guest speaker and a garden visit, Kentish Garden Club runs two major community events. One is coming up over the weekend of November 23-24 when seven local gardens are open to the public as part of Kentish GardenFEST.

The other is Sheffield FlowerFEST, when Sheffield Town Hall is filled with cut flowers over the first weekend of February (February 1-2, 2025).

Both events raise funds for the club and to donate to community groups. One recent donation has been \$400 to Kentish House towards the purchase and planting of raised garden beds to grow vegetables and herbs.

Check your fruit trees for Black aphids now

It is in late spring/early summer when we start having problems with Myzus cerasi (Cherry blackfly, commonly known as Black aphids). They affect our fruiting and flowering cherries (Prunus cerasus, P. avium, P. padus)

Very soon, with the foliage coming out in the warmer weather, the aphids will hatch from under the bark and make their way to the new growth.

Now is the best time to start checking our trees each week for their early signs. These aphids won't affect your fruit crop, but its best to get on top of these sap sucking insects before they start getting a hold and disform the new growth, and then sooty mould will also appear on the foliage.

In the short term, spraying with Pyrethrum or a garlic spray will control the aphids, and you can prune off and bag the distorted growth, but long term the best approach is to provide plants that attract beneficial insects such as ladybirds, hoverflies, lacewings and parasitic wasps. You then will have your own little army attacking the insects and eating them.

Here is a list of plants that will do the job – Achillea, Alyssum, Artemesia, Calendula, Cosmos, Dill, Marigold, Fennel and Sunflowers. Plants like Achillea can be planted as a ground cover around the base of the trees.

So in summary – routinely check for aphids, prune any significant damage, bag and bin, spray with pyrethrum or garlic (check for beneficial insects first, you don't want to kill them) Remember, spraying should be your last approach.

program. Over the past five years hundreds of trees have been planted in streets in Sheffield and Railton to beautify the towns and to add to the amenity of residents and road users.

The first planting was in High Street, Sheffield where a mix of dogwoods for spring flowers and maples for autumn colour were planted and are growing well. The planting of 'Gumball' liquidambars as part of the Main Street upgrade was also recommended by the Street Tree committee.

Locals may have noticed that two trees in the avenue planting in Main Street failed, probably due to damage to the graft. While the understock suckered, the lollipop-shaped top growth remained leafless last year.

These trees have now been replaced and will soon be leafing up along with the established trees to soften the approach to town along Main Street from the east. 'Gumball' liquidambars were selected as they are compact attractive deciduous trees that can be grown under powerlines. They produce striking autumn colour and have bright green new leaves in spring.

COMMENT - WHAT YOU OUGHT TO KNOW ABOUT POLITICS

'Excuse me, are you interested in politics?' 'You must be joking.' 'They're all the same, a boring lot who tell lies, are corrupt, yell at each other and ... well, I am not interested in politics it's nothing to do with me.'

'Tell me, do you have an opinion on Ambulance ramping?' 'What's that, I've have never heard of it, what's this all about?' 'Well, this is where in our major hospitals in this State all too often there are not enough patient beds, so they have to leave the patient inside the ambulance until a bed is ready. This means the ambulance is not freed up to go to another emergence call. What do you think about this?' 'Bloody awful if you ask me – it shouldn't happen.'

'Ok how about this one. Most of us drive on Tasmanian roads which are not too bad, do you agree?' 'No, I do not. I have to travel a lot over potholes, unmade at times when they are digging up the road which causes me delays and we need better roads that last longer.'

'Thank you for that and lastly, should Tasmania have more or less tourists?' 'I don't know. I suppose we need more 'cos it keeps people like me in work and it helps the economy but maybe too many might be a problem. Sometimes there are too many caravans on our busy roads which slows down traffic.'

'Thank you for giving me your time. Just before you go, I would like to say something. When I asked you if you were interested in politics you answered 'no'. Yet all your answers do relate to politics in some way which tells me not only do you have an opinion but how important these issues are to you.' So why, dear reader, should we be interested in politics?

'Politics helps you to know your rights', 'Politics clarifies what you yourself believe', 'Politics is a living, breathing subject', 'Politics helps you to understand the different political parties' and 'Politics prepares you for adult life'.

Of course, there are many other things to add to this list, including it helps people to 'become informed voters' and it 'provides a voice and platform for the people'.

However, as A.C Graying says in his 2020 book *Principles of Democracy*, politics and governance are not the same thing in a 'Good State'. Politics is about voting, election campaigns, human rights, freedom of assembly, access to education and economic opportunities, among others.

Government is for the protection of its people, having public order, the making of legislation and much more.

Of course, none of this is going to be perfect and there will always be in a Democratic State, detractors who would argue their point of view, something which is not allowed in many autocratic or oppressive countries.

What the public want are two fundamental and simple arguments, the first is being sufficiently educated to understand the principles (the main idea) of why and how to vote.

The second argument relates to the fairness by a government to govern in the interests of its people.

There is ample evidence that any form of government is not always in the best interests of the people.

In recent years there has been a downward slide where party politics and populism have eroded some basic principles.

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
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We say thank you: Ellis

About 20 years ago I was approached by Quota International, a wonderful organisation who asked for my help to distribute free books to several schools in Queensland. This included listening to the children read part of their donated book – many struggled and were embarrassed.

I undertook training in order to offer personal help through The Queensland Ready Reading Programme, whose charter is to create an Australia where all children by age 8 are literate and can read confidently.

Eventually, after retiring, I dedicated my time across three schools, personal results being very rewarding and inspiring. Working one-on-one and building trust and confidence has had amazing results.

One school I worked with had a "therapy" dog and the children would read to the dog. They loved this opportunity.

In 2015 I settled in Tasmania and worked closely with Sheffield School, including the Railton campus, and helped with the music program, too, until Covid hit.

Now I would like to continue this work with children and my own dog, a soft and gentle poodle. She frets when I am away so I can work at home where there are no distractions and would suggest two 45-minute periods a week. Transport to and from can be arranged.

Interestingly, studies have proven that children who learn music almost always excel in other subjects.

Hoping I can help so please feel free to contact me if you have an interest in my objectives for our equal first most precious resource. Now long retired, this service is free, my reward is the happy face of a child achieving their full potential.

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Tourism booming again

The latest International Visitor Survey shows international and domestic tourism is continuing to boom with every state and territory now exceeding pre-COVID levels. In the year to June 2024, Tasmania received 3 million visitors – or 13 million nights stayed – with 2 million visiting regional Tasmania and more than \$2 billion worth of expenditure in the state.

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No landfill levy after storms

The Tasmanian Government has waived the landfill levy as it delivers additional support for Tasmanians impacted by the recent severe weather. Premier Jeremy Rockliff said to support

clean-up efforts from rain and flooding across Tasmania, the Government was waiving the landfill levy payable by landfill operators for disposal of extreme weather waste. "This will make it easier for people to remove materials damaged or left on their property by the floodwaters," he said.

The waiver will be in place until November 30, 2024.

Landfill operators will be provided with information about how to apply the fee exemption.

Residents do not need to take additional actions but should confirm eligibility with their landfill operator or inform their

landfill operator or inform their landfill operator that they are disposing of waste generated by the severe weather event.

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
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
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
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


Sheffield School will be hosting the Junior Cattle Handlers Show of Tasmania on Friday, November 8, at the School Farm, 1A High Street.

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Upper Paradise pioneers settle

After looking at Lower Paradise last month, let's continue to identify the early settlers of Upper Paradise.

274 Morse Rd, Hilltop: Arn Morse built close to the sites of **William & Pamela Whiley's** *Hilltop* house, the first settlers in Paradise, and **George & Amelia Morse's** first house, *Norwood*. After George died, sons **Arn and Cyril** share farmed the old Morse family property. Arn had previously lost his first wife and his only daughter. After **Heather MacRae** from Victoria turned up as the new Paradise school teacher in Jan 1938, Arn married her in Nov 1939 and they had four children. Heather taught school at Sheffield for many years. Arn died at home in Sept 1974. In 1987 **Michael & Margaret Duff** purchased the farm, and **Steve & Rehan Jones** bought the house.

277 Paradise Rd: *Pink Cottage* was the name given to the quaint little house placed opposite the entrance to Morse Rd, which was originally the Ladies Rest Room in High St, Sheffield. **Bert Hampton** moved it to Paradise, where disabled pensioner **Dudley Kelly** lived for 15 years. In 1989 **Bernard** (60) & **Eileen Ridgley** came from Melbourne after Bernard's doctor advised changing his lifestyle. His daily routine had been a gruelling 80-minute drive from his Dandenong home through 138 sets of traffic lights to the Melbourne CBD.

300 Paradise Rd, Cloverlea & Glenview: After Charles & Amelia Frankcombe married at Beulah in 1904, they purchased the property *Glenview*. Charles had previously lost his first wife and was left with four children. In 1906 Charles got the contract for a bi-weekly mail run to Sheffield. Tragically, Amelia died on Christmas Day 1910, aged 29. Charles's third marriage, to Margaret Carey in 1912, produced sons Maurice and Ross. Les & Win Dyer bought the property in 1927 and had Jock McCoy build a new house, *Cloverlea*, in front of the original house, which they rented to Laurie Mace in 1936. The farm was purchased by Fred & Chloris Murfet in 1948, Bert & Betty Hampton in 1967 and Michael & Margaret Duff in 1979.

303 Paradise Rd: After **Roy Austin** married **Dorothy Sharman** in 1935, they built this house and added a special room for the PO. Dorothy took over as postmistress from her sister Linda (1924–1928) and relinquished it in Nov 1953 when Roy & Dorothy moved to Sheffield. **Cliff & Vena Treloar** operated the PO until July 1959, followed by **Peggy Munting** till July 1961 when an automatic telephone exchange at Sheffield took over.

309 Paradise Rd: Roy Austin built this house on a 1-acre block for Laurie & Evelyn Mace. They lived there 1940–1946, then sold to Walter & Elvie Wilson. Ted & Laurice Sharman were the next owners. Married in 1923, they never owned a motor car and rarely left Paradise. Ted was a trapper, bullocky, bush worker and seasonal worker on harvesting machines. They loved country dances, where Ted played his harmonica. Ted & Laurice celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary in 1992, with Ted becoming the oldest man in Paradise. Clarrie & Faye Milne spent time here before moving to Sheffield.

321 Paradise Rd, Fern Tree Grove: Herbert (Bert) Sharman married **Alice Milne** in 1901 and raised a big family of 13 in Paradise. Their first house, built over the back of this property, was destroyed in the 1913 bushfires. Their second house was built closer to the road. In 1935 Herbert moved to Kindred, and son **Ray (Pat) & Mary Sharman** took over the property.

368 Paradise Rd, Ben-Cruachan: Kentish boy **Arthur Murfet** went to WW1 and came home with a Scottish war bride. In 1921 he obtained this 59-acre farm at Paradise and later another 98 acres along Harland Rise Rd., Arthur & Margaret had three children: **Kath** (Mrs Ray Duff), **Peggy** (Mrs Trevor Munting), who took over her father's farm, and **Fred** Murfet, who purchased the adjoining farm.

402 Paradise Rd, Woodside: Robert & Sarah Manning bought this 100-acre block in 1881, four years after Robert's older brother James Manning had settled further up Paradise Rd. They had 10 children. Robert (64) died in 1907. Milne Bros sold the property to **Abel & Mary (Manning) Austin** in 1920 where they raised their four boys, Vic, Cyril, Roy &

Lionel (Jack). About 1948 **Vinco Bossiner** and his parents came from Yugoslavia where they had a trucking business but lost everything in WW2. After borrowing money to buy the farm, they worked hard to pay back every penny. Vinco never married. Later, **Peter & Terrilea Gale** had the farm.

Paradise School: The first school began in Wm Treloar's house on the Minnow River side of Paradise. In 1895 the government selected a more central site on Paradise Rd just below the junction of Harland Rise Rd. The Paradise PO commenced at this school on 1 Oct 1898, when schoolteacher Mildred Marshall agreed to distribute the local mail. This continued until 19 May 1913 when a ferocious bushfire swept Paradise, destroying the school/PO. A new school was built by Sheffield builder Arthur Bayley. Popular teacher Eva Wyatt taught at Paradise between 1910-1925. Twice each day she rode her bicycle or horse up and down the steep hills of Old Paradise Rd between Sheffield and Paradise. Eva became engaged to young Paradise man Cliff Bramich, but when he was killed in France in Oct 1917, it broke her heart, and she never married. The school closed in 1942 and the children were transported by bus to Sheffield Area School. In 1967 the old Paradise school was sold for \$70 to the Sheffield Bowls Club to become their new club rooms.

Harland Rise Road (formerly Bramich & Overtons Rd)

Harland Rise Rd originally followed the boundary line of what was Foster Estate around its SE corner and today leads into the massive forestry plantations on Lizard Hill. Surveyor Dooley marked this road out in the late 1870s when he discovered several saleable blocks of land adjacent to Foster Estate. These were quickly purchased by Joseph Crack, Ephriam Doe and James Manning, who were the first settlers in Upper Paradise. Joseph Crack bought the first property along the southside of Harland Rise Rd, where later, James Coope lived in retirement on 'Coope's Corner'. Coope's remarkable life story was told in the Oct 2019 edition of The Kentish Voice. Later owners were Ed Smith, Reg Mace, Winston Pilgrim and Greg Henry. In April 2000, the Bingham family sold the property to the Forestry for plantation purposes. Ephraim Jr & Caroline Doe purchased the next property about 1878, where they raised a large family. Ephraim's ex-convict father lived in a small hut on their property. Later the family moved to Roland, where Ephraim became a trustee of the Kentishbury Gospel Hall.

Caroline (44) died having her 13th child. Further up Harland Rise Rd **George & Alice Overton** bought 48 acres in 1895. A nephew to original pioneer **Henry Overton**, George came out from England independently some 30 years after the original Overtons, whom he had never met. George married **Alice Billing**, with their most famous descendant being world-famous axeman David Foster. **Clive & Nina (Overton) Febey** took over the Overton farm.

Chas & Eliza Bramich purchased a block from Foster Estate in 1913, naming it *Harland Rise*. One of their 10 children, Clifton Bramich, was killed in WWI. Another son, Reuben Bramich, married Annie Kirkcaldy and took over his father's property in 1935. Reuben & Annie had two children, Doris & Rex, who both died tragically. During Rex's time in the Kentish council, the names of many country roads were formalised and, instead of Bramichs Rd, Rex suggested Harland Rise Rd. In 1972, Rex was killed in a bulldozer accident the day after his 49th birthday. The next owners of the Harland Rise property were Rodney & Dot Gleeson.

The original Baptist Church was built by **Henry Morris** of Sheffield in 1905 on land provided by James Manning on top of his hill. Twenty-three years later, a vicious windstorm picked up the church and hurled it 50 metres down the hill. **Reg Mace** donated a corner of his land on Harland Rise Rd for a replacement site. Built in the Depression, it opened in April 1931 with seats, an organ and a pulpit from the old Beulah Baptist church. Charles Bramich's wife, **Elsie**, was the first SS superintendent, followed by Arthur Murfet. As families moved away, services were reduced to once a month. Sheffield pastor **Bruce French** finally closed the church in 1992 when Mrs **Stella Sharman** became the only local left.

Dawson Rd (originally Hoare's and Treloar's Rd)

This road followed around the NW sides of **Robert Manning's** 100-acre property, past the prominent sugar-loaf hill into the foothills of Mt Roland. From earliest times, there was a good walking track between Hoare's Rd at Paradise across the foothills of Mt Roland to join Walkers Rd at Claude Rd. It was an important link between these two communities, who regularly interacted for social, church and sporting events. Most likely this track followed the original aboriginal path coming from the west that passed up through Paradise to the Mt Gog ochre mines.

About 1885 **Wm & Bessie Luttrell** took up two blocks along the mountain side of Dawson Rd. His sister **Jane Luttrell** became the first teacher at Paradise from 1892–94. In 1901 Luttrell moved to West Kentish Rd, served on the Road Trust and later served as treasurer of the new Kentish Council. Later, the Treloars had this property, which **Jack & Joyce (Manning) Dawson** purchased in 1951 (hence Dawsons Rd). Raised at Gowrie Park, Jack Dawson (22) found himself fighting up the Kokoda Track in WW2 but fortunately survived. Very musical, Jack played numerous instruments in Claude Road dance bands. Brought up in the Dawson home, **Shirl Brown** has made a name for herself as a well-known Australian country & western singer and recording artist. **Arthur Ford** bought out Jack & Joyce Dawson when they moved to Devonport.

Wm & Jane Milne moved from Parkham with their large adult family to farm Luttrell's property. It wasn't long before their six daughters married local farmers: Bruce Morris, John Manning, Herb Sharman, Ernie Nunn, Norm Hope and

Ernie Treloar. Walter became an elder at the West Kentish Presbyterian Church when it opened and held fortnightly services in his home. William died in 1912. Son Walter Milne married Carol Treloar, who died in childbirth in 1933 when Clarrie Milne was born.

James & Elizabeth Hoare bought 102 acres on the highest plateau in Paradise. Born in Ireland in 1839, young James Hoare went to the USA and fought in the Red Indian wars prior to joining his family who had immigrated to Tasmania. He married Elizabeth Cubit about 1866 and had five sons & five daughters. His three eldest sons met tragic deaths long before he died, aged 100. James Jr drowned, Jack was murdered at Wilmot and Michael burnt to death in a bushfire. Sam Hoare married Beatrice Treloar in 1917 and took over the Hoare family farm, while another son, William Hoare, sold off his 65 acres to Norman & Elsie Treloar, later owned by Kevin & Jean Treloar.

Henry Bishop b1865 came to Paradise in the late 1880s. He married Annie Smith in 1897, had three children, then took up sawmilling at Spreyton. His mother, who had children from each of her three marriages, lived with her younger son Andrew Smith at the end of Dawsons Rd. The Smiths were the first to get burnt out in the devastating bushfires of 1898.

Over the Top – the Minnow River side of Paradise 494 Paradise Rd: Amongst the first settlers, James & Alice Manning purchased their land about 1877. They had five sons & four daughters. As mentioned, Baptist services commenced in their home, and the Paradise Cricket Club formed there in Sept 1900. Sons Harry & Robert helped their father on the farm where James died in 1912, the last of the Paradise pioneers. The farm was purchased by Reg & Lorna Mace. George & Martha Eagling had bought a 70-acre bush block on the mountain side of James Manning. After five years, George returned to boot-making in Sheffield, and his son Ted, with Alice Eagling (6 chn), took over the farm.

The remarkable escape of Alice with her six small children from the devastating bushfires of 1898 is told in the Jan 2023 issue of *The Kentish Voice*.

Robert & Ellen Anderson were the first to farm the steep hill descending from Paradise to the Minnow Flats. In 1893 Lewis & Florence Newman took it over with their seven children. Florence became the gifted organist of the Baptist church. Oldest son, Lewis Newman, farmed after his father but left in 1925. Harry Newman moved to Sheffield in 1927. The farm was sold to **Ernest Billing** and, later, the Bingham family. William & Grace Treloar with family purchased a property near the Minnow River in 1888. A stonemason, Wm Treloar built many chimneys throughout Kentish. He and Grace opened their home for the first school classes and Anglican church gatherings. When **Canon Icely** began visiting the Minnow River in 1891, he baptised over a dozen children, including the three youngest Treloar children. The following year, English widow Maria Chalmers – who lived next door to Treloars – gifted an acre to the Church of England to erect a church, but because families began moving away, nothing eventuated. Maria herself became the third wife of widower Reuben W. Austin of Paradise. William & Ruth (Treloar) Kenzie eventually took over the Treloars' farm. Today, nearly all Upper Paradise and the Minnow River farms are covered with plantation timber.

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
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25 years since ADF mission to East Timor

Following years of political campaigning for independence from Indonesia, the Timorese finally had their opportunity via an independence referendum in August 1999.

In the wake of the vote, pro-Indonesian militias began attacking civilians. Violence spread throughout the country with entire towns being destroyed.

Around 1400 civilians were killed, and a staggering 500,000 people were either forcibly displaced from their homes or were forced to hide.

The events demanded an international response – and proudly, Australia stepped up.

In September 1999, under the leadership of Australia, the United Nations authorised the formation of the International Force for East Timor to restore peace, protect civilians and ensure humanitarian aid was being delivered.

Under the INTERFET banner, 5500 personnel from 22 countries participated in restoring stability to East Timor.

This was not just a military operation; it was a mission of compassion and justice, reflecting our nation's deep commitment to peace and human rights.

Among those who answered the call to serve were many Tasmanians. Our State has a proud and distinguished tradition of military service, and the East Timor deployment saw Tasmanians from diverse backgrounds stepping forward to contribute.

I must recognise a friend whose service to Tasmania and Australia exemplifies the very best of what it means to be a public servant and a patriot.

Gavin Pearce MP, a proud Tasmanian and a dedicated member of the Australian Parliament, has a distinguished record of service that deserves our utmost respect and gratitude.
